# REASONS TO BE JOYFUL

Perhaps I am getting too old, but has there been an approaching year in the last 60 years filled with such gloom and uncertainty?

I am writing several weeks before the start of the year but it is impossible to see how we will go into 2019

with anything but "Brexit" chaos. This will compound the growing issues poverty of inequality and in this country. In November. Philip Alston, the United Nations' special

rapporteur on extreme poverty and human rights conducted a study of Britain. Philip Alston concluded that the UK is "heading towards an alienated society, and one which won't look like what Britain thinks it wants to look like."

As if our own home issues are not enough to darken our setting out into

the new year, we have the warnings that we have just two years to tackle climate change, to attempt to curb the temperature rises that threaten to tip our world into chaos. David Attenborough told the December UN Climate Change Summit, "Right now we are facing a manmade disaster of global scale, our greatest threat in thousands of years: climate change. If we don't take action, the collapse of our civilisations and the extinction of much of the natural world is on the horizon."

Gloom and huge uncertainty indeed. It is incumbent on all of us, to take note, not look away, do what we can to bring change; poor governance, crippling poverty, reckless, suicidal

abuse of the environment are all an affront to God and mankind.

However, I refuse to despair; there are always reasons for the Christian to be joyful:-



# HOLY TRINITY WOMEN'S GROUP



#### A BISHOP AT THE DOOR

One bright and chilly day in mid-November, the Women's Group (from our village church and beyond) had an unusual visitor...

The morning began and ended with peals, not of bells but of laughter. And that says something about this amazing group of women who gather in a Westcott home each Tuesday morning to eat cake, share joys, sorrows and questions, explore the Bible and pray, encouraging and supporting one another in things of faith - and life in general. On that particular day, it was as we frivolously experimented over coffee with '101 things to do with an old pair of tights' (we were meant to be making them into stretchy headbands for a school assembly!) that Bishop Jo appeared in the doorway. Perhaps not the sort of welcome she's used to, but it swiftly became clear that this woman prefers to be treated like anyone else: within minutes she too was laughing, plaiting headbands and insisting that we dispense with the "Bishop" title.

Jo Bailey Wells is, however, the tenth female bishop in the Church

of England. She came here to be Suffragan Bishop of Dorking after three years as Chaplain to Justin Welby, the Archbishop of Canterbury. Her leaving gift from the staff at Lambeth Palace was a pair of Doc Martens boots in bishop's purple to replace her plain black ones and match the shirt. Hannah, a member of the group, invited Jo to tell us what had gone before. And we heard how in her youth this "child of privilege" spent a life-changing year doing voluntary service in a South African mission hospital. The experience opened her eyes to the imbalance of the world and, as she put it, "rocked my world". Jo was humbled by the faith of Christian people she met there who, despite living in immense poverty and as victims of apartheid, exuded joy, warmth and staggering generosity. Although uncertain what it would mean in practice, Jo knew at this stage that she wanted to make a difference somehow, and believed that serving God full-time was the way to do it. For her the world simply didn't make sense without God and it was through seeing Him in others that her own faith evolved. After

natural sciences at university, she took her still frustrated idealism across the Atlantic to do a masters degree in Intercultural Communication at the University of Minnesota. It was here that her path to ministry began to take shape. She served as a parish assistant in the episcopal church and found that this role combined all the work strands she had previously felt drawn to: teaching, social work and counselling.

On return to the UK, Jo began training for ordained ministry at a theological college in Durham. "I thought I'd landed", she explained. And while studvina she also landed herself a husband - another student and vicar, Sam Wells (now at St Martinin-the-Fields). Since being ordained as a priest she has had two children and worked in many roles, mainly in colleges of higher education doing pastoral work, chaplaincy, counselling and teaching. particular areas of responsibility here in Guildford Diocese are education. including our local church schools. and the recruitment of cleray.

And Jo does indeed see her role of bishop as a great responsibility. She talked of the importance of honesty and authenticity, and of how her title and position can sometimes get in the way if people feel they can't be open and real with her. Recognising the weight her words carry presents both challenges and opportunities, but above all keeps her dependent on God for what to say. Looking back, she believes that the first female priests and bishops had it hard, and in comparison her path has been easy. Nonetheless, she admits that hers can be a lonely role and the support of those who pray for her is valued immensely.



So that is how we ended the mornina once the raucous laughter arising from several failed attempts at a group photo had subsided. We prayed for Jo as she headed off to St Paul's Church to join a panel speaking on 'God and Suffering' before an audience of 130 Philosophy and Ethics A level students. And we sent her on her way with the assurance that if she was ever passing through Westcott on a Tuesday morning, there would always be cake, prayer and a warm welcome here.\*



#### CALL TO ACTION!

The need to tack action to tackle climate change is urgent. words of the much-admired Sir David Attenborough "If we don't take action, the collapse of our civilisations and the extinction of much of the natural world is on the horizon."

And that horizon is looming fast. The United Nations Secretary General said last September, "if we do not change course by 2020 we risk missing the

point where we can avoid runaway climate change, with disastrous consequences for people and all the natural systems that sustain us "

This call to action is good news. It means that we still have the chance



to avert the worst impacts of climate change. But we need to act now. This is a great opportunity to build a brighter future. Renewable energy improves energy security, is cleaner and is becoming cheaper, than burning fossil fuels. A future built on renewables will be more equitable and cleaner air will benefit millions - a recent report stated that 90% of the world's children are currently breathing in toxic air.

Reforestation is another way in which carbon emissions can be reduced rapidly, whilst also creating healthier and happier societies. Trees and plants remove carbon dioxide from the atmosphere, and have many



benefits for community, habitats and wildlife.

The solutions are available now, what is needed is the political will to implement them and. where that lacking, public pressure

to change their minds.

We need radical societal change to reduce our negative impact on the environment and improve the health and wellbeing of people and the planet. Tackling climate change is crucial step in tackling poverty and iniustice too.

#### CLIMATE ACTION

### 1. What is the most important climate action to take?

It is essential to limit the use of fossil fuels – oil, coal and natural gas – in order to reduce carbon emissions that are warming the atmosphere, and replace them with clean, renewable energy. The transition away from fossil fuels includes everyday decisions, such as: driving and flying less; choosing seasonal and local food; using 'green' energy suppliers.

System-wide change are needed too, such as ending fossil fuel subsidies in the form of tax breaks and optimising infrastructure for renewable energy and electric vehicles.

#### 2. Would changing my diet make a difference?

After fossil fuels, the food industry is one of the largest contributors to climate change - meat and dairy, in particular. If cattle were a nation they would have the third largest greenhouse gas emissions, after China and the US! Choosing to eat more meat-free meals and cutting down on dairy products makes a significant difference.



# 3. How can I affect what businesses and politicians do?

You can exercise your rights as a citizen and as a consumer. Individual choices can help drive wider change, by encouraging others - to walk or cycle more, to use reusable coffee cups, or to buy fewer clothes - and by showing our leaders what is important to us.

Just consider the momentum, generated by the Blue Planet II series, in people shunning single-use plastic, devoting time to clean up beaches and launching petitions for supermarkets and the government to act to reduce plastic pollution.

#### CLIMATE ACTION NEWS

Have you heard of Extinction Rebellion? This international, grassroots social movement launched last year and aims to drive radical change, through nonviolent direct action, in order to curtail species extinction and avert climate

breakdown. The movement is backed by over 100 academics, including former Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams and supported by environmental activist and writer, George Monbiot.



# Slow Cooked Pomegranate Ox Cheeks

2 ox cheeks, cut in half

100g plain flour

Freshly ground salt and pepper

1 onion

1 carrot

1 stick of celery

2 bay leaves

1 knob of butter

1 large glass of red wine

1.5 cups pomegranate juice

1 tbsp pomegranate molasses

Large glug of extra virgin olive oil

#### Method (Serves 2)

- Pat the ox cheeks dry with kitchen paper, then season with freshly ground salt and black pepper.
- Toss the cheeks in plain flour, then lightly sear in a pan with a glug of oil, on both sides until nicely browned, then remove from the pan.
- 3. Finely dice the onion, carrot and celery and sauté in a knob of butter on a medium heat for 6-7 minutes.
- 4. Place the onion, carrot and celery mixture and with the bay leaves into a slow cooker on a medium heat setting, followed by the ox cheeks, pomegranate juice, molasses and red wine.
- Cook for six hours. (If cooking in an oven, cook at 150 degrees C for 4-5 hours).
- When ready, remove the ox cheeks from the slow cooker/oven, and loosely cover with foil to keep warm.
- Discard the bay leaves and transfer the liquid into a saucepan, bring to the boil and allow to reduce until it is syrupy. Stir regularly.
- Serve the ox cheeks with butternut squash mash and the reduced sauce drizzled on top, finished with some fresh pomegranate seeds.

# WESTCOTT HISTORY GROUP

#### Worms, Ashes & Bones

On Tuesday 13th November Emma Corke entertained us with the revelations uncovered by 142 years of periodic excavation between 1876 and 2018 at Cocks Farm, Abinger where an ancient Roman Villa was located.

On 19th November 1876 Thomas Henry Farrer wrote to his son to tell him that while digging behind his farm house he had found pottery, ceramics and coins from the Antonine Era to the Constantine Era of the Roman presence in England.



Later carbon dating of the relics discovered, showed that this equated to about AD 70 to AD 134. T.H.Farrer invited his friend Henry Darwin to help put together a plan for excavating the area methodically in 1877. At about 4ft down they discovered some very artistic mosaic flooring which they followed up to delineate the layout of this Roman Villa. Darwin had developed a



technique of dating remains by means of the worm casts discovered in the excavations.

Work done over the years has shown that it consisted of 8 rooms with a south facing verandah. The Surrey Archaeological Society members have been able to identify and classify the artefacts that turned up during the excavations.

More recent (late 20th and 21st century) excavations in the area have revealed Iron Age artefacts and traces of the agricultural activity in the Medieval period, such as relics of a vineyard and animal bones with farm dwellings and evidence of a fireplace. The latter have proved useful in Carbon 14 dating the age of the settlement. As a result of this work the area has been declared a 'Scheduled Monument'.

Emma Corke has played an important role in leading much of the recent work and recording it. She displayed

It is the time of year when we all try to make resolutions to do something different in the coming year and I have been thinking about what the WVA might do to differently which will have a positive impact on the Village.


There are a number of things we will be discussing as a WVA Committee – hopefully with some new members who can bring fresh thinking to the discussions.

Here are some things on our agenda for 2019:

• Following on from James Friend's article in last month's magazine I was reflecting on the success of the survey which the Westcott Village Forum ran about 5 years ago and which 87% of households responded to. The feedback informed not only the Neighbourhood Development Plan but a lot of thinking around what the village needed in the coming years; as an example, the Hut Trustees have built some of this into their thinking around what the new community centre might provide

once it is finished. Things change in 5 years and it is perhaps time to run another survey to inform decisions over the coming years.

- In November the Chairpersons of the Reading Room, The Hut, The Sports Club, the Surrey Hills Primary School Governors, and Holy Trinity Church, together with your elected District and County Councillors, met again to discuss how we work together for the good of the whole community. The principle that this is what we all want has been accepted and we agreed to continue to meet; what we now need to do is put ideas into practice. The survey mentioned above may be a good start and we are all committed to sharing ideas, resources, and knowledge to achieve this.
- The Village Association will have a new Website for the new year and we also now have a Facebook page. Our aim is to share information through these mediums and improve communication across the village. Please use this to communicate events and activities in the village. - The first draft of the new Village Association constitution will be discussed at the January meeting of the committee. Interestingly both the Reading Room and the Sports

#### **Tackling Homelessness**

Mole Valley District Council is part way through delivering the five-year Homelessness Strategy and a key success has been to achieve National Practitioner Support Service (NPSS) Gold Standard for Homelessness. NPSS supports local authorities to deliver early intervention and prevention-focused housing options services.

The council team completed ten evidence-based challenges and achieved a high score of 72% in the peer review. This is a considerable accolade, as only 16 local authorities have achieved the accreditation. It demonstrates the local commitment to prevent homelessness, customer care and best practice.



Such recognition though is only of value if outcomes for individuals

and families are being changed. Last year saw a reduction in the number of families placed in bed breakfast accommodation and with no families have had to stay in this type of accommodation for more than six weeks. Mole Valley has increased its number of emergency accommodation units that temporarily house homeless families. Two new self-contained properties have been acquired to increase the council's stock for homeless households, which now totals 29

The council has also been enhancing and improving its housing service through Government grants received from implementing the Homelessness Reduction Act. Two new job roles have been created: a Housing Options Officer to enhance the housing advice service, and a Housing Intelligence Officer to detect housing fraud. There is also a proposal to adapt the service to provide money and budgeting advice to those facing homelessness and assist clients affected by Universal Credit.

Since the current strategy took effect in 2015, the council has helped 137 households access accommodation within the private rented sector through the HomeChoice Plus rent deposit bond scheme. Currently there are 150 households living in the private rented sector who have

been supported through the scheme and 62 have been since April 2017. Furthermore, 40 new affordable homes were completed in 2017/18.

Although this is good progress, the council team will continue to carry out the actions set out in the strategy as they work to help some of the most vulnerable people in our district. # **Burglary Prevention Advice This Winter**

During the winter period, we traditionally see an increase in burglaries of homes, garages and outbuildings. In many cases homes remain insecure, with a third of all break-ins involving little to no force from the burglar, allowing them to easily enter a property.



C o m m u n i t y Safety represents a key priority for our local police team and they are keen to make sure that all residents

know that there are lots of steps homeowners can take to make their property a less attractive target to burglars.

## Top Tips to avoid burglary

- Restrict access to your back garden by making sure you have a solid and secure fence and lockable gate.
- Always lock your doors and windows, even if you're not going out for very long. The use of deadlocks on all outside doors is advisable.
- Do not leave keys in locks or in plain view from outside i.e. near doors or by windows. Also consider investing in a home security alarm.
- Marking your property with Smart Water or SelctaDNA will enable them to be easily identified should your

belongings be stolen. This also acts as a deterrent to thieves.

- Remember to register for free all identifiable property through IMMOBILISE.
- Install low-level, exterior lighting to act as a deterrent
- If your home is going to be unoccupied at any time after dusk, the use of timers to bring on lights in a staggered pattern can convey the impression that someone is at home.



#### **OFSTED MONITORING REVIEW**

## Serious weaknesses first monitoring inspection of Surrey Hills Church of England Primary School

Following my visit to your school on 7 and 8 November 2018, I write on behalf of Her Majesty's Chief Inspector of Education, Children's Services and Skills to confirm the outcome and inspection findings. Thank you for the help that you gave during the inspection and for the time that you made available to discuss the actions that have been taken since the school's most recent section 5 inspection.

The inspection was the first monitoring inspection since the school was judged to have serious weaknesses in November 2017. It was carried out under section 8 of the Education Act 2005.



#### **Evidence**

During this inspection, meetings were held with the Headteacher, other senior and middle leaders, members of the interim executive board (IEB) and a representative of the local authority. The local authority's statement of action and the school's action plans were evaluated. I scrutinised safeguarding documentation with you and your assistant Headteachers and inclusion leader. Together with you, your assistant Headteacher and inclusion leader, I visited lessons to observe pupils at work. I also scrutinised work in pupils' books. I observed pupils' conduct at break time and lunchtime.

#### Context

This was the first monitoring visit since the school's section 5 inspection in November 2017. The school's senior leadership structure has remained stable, with the addition of a third assistant Headteacher. The governing body was replaced with an IEB in January 2018. The school is situated on two separate sites in the villages of Westcott and Abinger Common. The school roll has fallen. Currently there are fewer pupils registered at the school than in 2017. This is attributed to the school's decision to decrease the published admission number at key stage 1 from 45 to 30 and a local drop in the birth rate.

### The quality of leadership and management at the school

This monitoring inspection report confirms your and other senior leaders' views as well as that of the governing body that much work has been done to address the inspection findings fully. Senior leaders and governors have addressed with urgency the issues raised in the inspection report, resulting in sharpened safeguarding practices.

The school's action plan for improvement focuses with precision on the weaknesses identified during the November 2017 inspection. Suitable actions are identified alongside success measures, timescales and responsibilities to ensure swift and effective improvement. For example, an independent safeguarding review conducted by the local authority made a series of recommendations both for the school and the local authority. These recommendations have been successfully implemented in the school's safeguarding arrangements. Safeguarding leads have attended enhanced safeguarding training to ensure that all areas of the school's safeguarding procedures are fit for purpose. In collaboration with the local authority safeguarding lead, the school has



completely revised the procedure for assessing the risk of adults who work at the school when facing allegations. The procedure is checked and monitored effectively by governors and where necessary by the local authority. The school has implemented this very successfully. This procedure has been issued to all schools in the local authority. Leaders have a strong understanding of the statutory early year's framework and changes to safeguarding procedures have been implemented since the last inspection report. To ensure the safety of pupils, leaders have also introduced a ban on the use of mobile phones in the school. This has been implemented very successfully and staff and adults appreciate the vigilance of leaders in keeping pupils safe.

Leaders and staff are highly alert to changes in pupils' behaviour and ensure that pupils receive the support that they require. Safeguarding leaders are tenacious in referring cases where pupils are identified as being at risk of harm. Safeguarding documentation is securely maintained and reviewed frequently to ensure that every single child at the school is safe. The single central record of checks on staff and adults meets statutory requirements and is regularly reviewed by the safeguarding governor. Staff files are well maintained. All staff receive regular safeguarding training. Consequently, staff are acutely aware of how to protect the pupils in their care.

As identified in the previous report, leaders have developed a very strong curriculum in Reception that is both stimulating and enriching. Throughout the curriculum, children develop knowledge, skills and understanding about how to keep safe in school and beyond. For example, through skilful questioning, teachers enable children to articulate their feelings during circle time. To strengthen children's ability to voice their experiences, leaders have embedded a focus on philosophy in the early years curriculum. Consequently, children discuss their feelings about various concepts. It is too early, however, to judge the impact of this approach. Drawing on external agencies such as the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, leaders ensure that children learn about how to keep safe at school and beyond.

Pupils unanimously state that they feel safe and well cared for in the school. Pupils and staff have very strong working relationships which create a harmonious learning atmosphere. One pupil in Year 2 commented that the school was perfect, and this was echoed by many other pupils. To enable pupils to keep safe, leaders have introduced a system whereby pupils can leave a teardrop shaped note on their teacher's desk if they have a concern. Many pupils stated



very clearly that they had used this system and that staff had responded swiftly and sensitively to help them. Leaders have also appointed pupils as 'sports crew' to support and help other pupils at break and lunchtime if they encounter friendship difficulties. Many pupils stated that this was highly effective. As stated in the previous report, pupils say that bullying is very rare and if it does happen, staff resolve issues quickly and effectively. The school's focus on ensuring that pupils are safe when using the internet is also very effective. Pupils understand the importance of keeping safe and know what to do. The school also monitors pupils' use of technology very well.

Pupils with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND) receive effective support to ensure that they can access the curriculum equitably and successfully. The social and emotional well-being of these pupils is supported very well by the school. Additional support such as the home–school link worker and the emotional literacy support assistants ensure that pupils feel safe and well cared for. Pupils' physical health is supported extremely well by the school. Leadership of physical education is a strength of the school. Pupils have a wide range of sporting opportunities to strengthen their physical health and well-being. Pupils' social and emotional well-being is considered throughout the well-structured curriculum. For example, pupils experience the process of democracy through campaigning and elections to the school council.


As identified in the previous inspection report, the quality of teaching, learning and assessment is strong. Through well-structured sequences of lessons, pupils, including the most able pupils, make good progress across the curriculum in all year groups. Through additional staff training, teachers and teaching assistants consistently ensure that pupils with SEND are able to access the curriculum successfully.

Following the monitoring inspection, the following judgements were made:

Leaders and managers are taking effective actions towards the removal of the serious weaknesses designation.

The school's action plan is fit for purpose.

As a change from our normal article about local businesses, I thought you might like to know about something else, a Business which happens monthly, in Westcott. It's the Village Coffee Morning. You will all have seen the adverts which appear here in the magazine, and you will all know that it happens on the morning of the first Wednesday of the month (not January) in the Reading Room off the Guildford Road.

Then the excitement came when Father Christmas arrived at the woodland with



## DORKING MUSEUM

Dorking Museum wishes a happy new year to all readers and to the supporters and friends of the Museum. The Museum re-opens after the festive break on 10th January.

If things have gone a little flat after the festive season, here are a few additional dates that you might want to celebrate. In 'Recollections of Old Dorking', written about life in the town nearly two centuries ago, Charles Rose recalls that many of the town's residents still had trouble accepting the switch from the Julian to the Gregorian calendar in 1752 which 'lost' days. They resulted in 11 "adhered to the Old Style", and so January 5th or 6th became "Old Christmas, or Twelfth Day", when they "regaled themselves and their households with Christmas fare".

Twelfth Night then was also "the lottery night for twelfth cakes". Elaborate "iced and otherwise

ornamented cakes" were displayed the the window of known establishment of Mr. Uwins. in High Street". The appearance of the "head cake" heralded the lottery, and with it, "a flutter of excitement which attained its highest pitch when the joyful cry of "prize!" or the depressing one of "blank!" was uttered." In the 1870s, Queen Victoria banned rowdy Twelfth Night festivities as they were becoming a threat to Civil Peace! (But, celebration-lovers, note that 'Old Twelfth Night' may still be celebrated on January 17th.)

## Our current exhibition: The Rob Walker Racing Team:

One of the most successful privateer motor racing teams, the Rob Walker Racing Team were based in London Road, Dorking, and here the cars were developed, built and tested. Between 1958and1968theybeatthemightyworks teams in nine Grand Prix, including three wins around the streets of Monaco. The most successful of their drivers was Stirling Moss, who had seven of the team's Grand Prix victories, including the three in Monaco.

There is a last chance to see this very popular exhibition, which remains open until January 26th and focuses on the life of Rob Walker, his Pippbrook Garage and workshops in Dorking, and the team's triumphs and tragedies over 30 years. Exhibits

Exhibition researcher Tom Loftus' new book, 'The Rob Walker Racing Team – Dorking's Part in Motor Racing History', tells the story from a Dorking perspective. The book, available from the Museum, features many un-published photographs and a touching foreword by Rob's son, Robbie Walker.

Opening on 31st January: 'Lord Ashcombe's Minerals – the gentlemen collectors and the advance of science'. The Museum's first new exhibition of 2019 showcases the history of and examples from Lord Ashcombe's stunning mineral collection. In the

19th century, George Cubitt, first the Lord Ashcombe, amassed extensive and impressive collection of fossils and minerals, which



were displayed at his Denbies home. His collection and those of other gentlemen collectors played an important role in an age of amateur science, in the development of the study of geology and palaeontology and the scientific understanding of the earth's history. The collections were donated to the Museum in 1948 by his grandson, the third Lord Ashcombe.

#### 'Local Heroes':

A short film telling the story of the prominent local suffrage and peace campaigners, Emmeline and Fred Pethick-Lawrence, filmed in Dorking, Holmwood and Leith Hill, is still available to view in the Museum to mark the centenary of the vote for women (any time during opening hours). Kathy Atherton's book on the fight for the vote in the Surrey Hills is also on sale.



Happy New Year! January offers just a few concerts, together with lots of screenings of opera, ballet and concerts at the Dorking Halls.

The Dante string quartet will give the first of a series of three concerts, arranged by the Dorking Concertgoers. These four young players appeared in Dorking just a few years ago, when they gave some excellent performances, and we are privileged to have them back again. Each concert will feature one of Beethoven's three powerful 'Razumovsky' quartets and this concert includes the first of them. The Dante quartet will also play an autobiographical quartet by Smetana and a quartet by Haydn. Two further concerts will follow in February.

January's lunchtime concert at St Martin's church will be given by Oliver and Sam Hancock and is based around the music of Flanders and Swann. Watermill Jazz begin their 25th year with a concert by the acclaimed singer, pianist and songwriter Joe Stilgoe. The programme continues with the Scott Hamilton Quartet (15th), the Alina Bzhezhinska Quartet (22nd), and the Karen Sharp Quartet (29th).

At the Dorking Halls you can see Tchaikovsky's Queen of Spades from the Royal Opera House – live on 22nd and then in a recording on 27th. Less often seen than Eugene Onegin, this is a dark and brooding opera filled with some gorgeous and deeply emotional music. Also from the Royal Opera there is Verdi's tragic La Traviata on 30th. From the Metropolitan Opera in New York comes something of a rarity – Adriana Lecouvreur by the Italian composer Francesco Cilea. André Rieu's New Year concert from Sydney is screened live on 5th and repeated the next day. Finally there is a recording from the Bolshoi Ballet in Moscow of La Bayadere.

## BRIGITTE TRUST APPEAL

## THE PAST IS A FOREIGN COUNTRY; THEY DO THINGS DIFFERENTLY THERE

This article recalls an event that took place in the Reading Room on 25th January 1888. Mrs Fuller, of the Rookery, and the Misses Barclay from Bury Hill, invited over 100 working men of the parish to a dinner in the Reading Room.

The reason for the invitation became clear after the meal when the Revd A G Joyce, Rector of Winnal, near Winchester, introduced himself as a member of the Central Emigration Society. After alluding to the great number of unemployed in the country, he showed the diners, by means of a map of the world, what vast regions belonging to Britain were waiting

to be peopled, and what facilities were offered by various



organisations to enable emigrants to reach these distant places, and also to help them on when there. He went on to give instances of emigrants who had left this country in very reduced circumstances, but after a short residence in one of our colonies were raised to a position of comparative affluence, and soon were able to pay for their friends to go from England to join them.

The lecturer confined his remarks primarily to the colony of Queensland and the dominion of Canada as affording facilities to the potential emigrant, and illustrated his talk with photographs of the various places mentioned; shown by means of the magic lantern. An associated scheme was the Petworth Emigration Society with which Charles Barclay of Bury Hill was closely associated, so if you have relatives in Canada it might be interesting to establish when and how they left the UK.
