BETTER TO LEARN HUMILITY BEFORE BEING HUMBLED

You may know that King David in the Old Testament is celebrated as the greatest monarch of Israel. This may seem surprising because he was a very flawed man; in weakness he committed adultery, and then compounded this with murder to try to cover his tracks. In spite of all this he is esteemed as the great archetype of the good leader. Why?

David, for all of his frailties of character, had the essential quality of all great leaders – humility. He knew his need of God.

and responded to Him in repentance and sorrow. In all of his mistakes, he turned back to God, recognising that there is a higher power than the self. David knew the sovereignty of God, and that the laws He has given are to be respected – they are there for a reason, for the well-being of all, the Good Society.

A yet greater example of humility is seen in Jesus Christ - His whole life was one of serving others, submitting, in love, to God, His Father. In such a life comes exultation. In the words of one of the New Testament letters: "he humbled himself by becoming

obedient to death - even death on a cross. 9 Therefore God exalted him to the highest place" (Phils 2:8-9) Jesus's life of humility was inexplicable for the authorities of His time. The Greco-Roman culture valued power. might, wealth; humility was despised rather than being seen as a virtue. And vet in the end, no-one can get away from the need to be humble. Jesus taught that the power of humility is ultimate reality: "Whoever exalts himself will be humbled." He said, "and whoever humbles himself will be exalted."- Matthew 23:12 Humility means letting go of selfabsorption, turning our gaze outwards, it's not about thinking

less of yourself but, in the words of CS Lewis, "thinking of yourself less". Humility means knowing our vulnerability and

dependence, being ever open and willing to learn. Humility is about

I am pleased to be able to report that the Joint Working Party (JWP), together with Dorking Medical Practice, has now instructed planning consultants to commence work on a preliminary study to review the feasibility of constructing a new Village Hall and a Doctors' Surgery on the Hut site. Given the importance of this project to the village, Westcott Village Association has kindly contributed to the costs of the initial study, which we gratefully acknowledge.

Delivering this project will be a complex task. In addition to clearing all the usual planning hurdles, we will need to secure financing and we will need to obtain permission from the Charity Commission to utilise the land assets of the two charitable trusts in a way which differs from the original purposes for which The Hut and The Reading Room were first established. Happily, the main objectives of both charities are remarkably similar, principally aimed at 'improving the conditions of life of the said inhabitants' of Westcott.

The JWP will do its best to deliver on that, and we will consult within the village and report on major developments as they occur.

WESTCOTT HISTORY GROUP



Listed Buildings in Surrey by Nigel Barker-Mills. (BA Hons. Phd.Dip Con
AA.IHBC.FSA.)

The lecture was preceded by the AGM. John Clachan, the Secretary, introduced our new Chairman Mrs Imogen Barker. The Chairman and Secretary's Reports were approved. The Secretary explained that due to the Reading Room having a new user booking every Tuesday throughout the year, the usual WLHG Lectures would have to be moved to the St John's Hall in the village starting on the 14th January 2020. Our last meeting in November will still be in the Reading Room, Members' attention was drawn to the changes made in the Reading Room Meeting Room to include other activity storage. The WLHG committee had lent a lot of effort to facilitate this. Renewed efforts were being made to complete the digitization of our records and avoid the use of storage cabinets.

The Treasurer, Glen Mardell, introduced the WLHG Annual Accounts, noting that there was a small surplus of £141. There was a question about the level of the annual subscription of £6, which is collected by Direct Debit from the majority of members. It is proposed to maintain this. The new Chairman, Imogen Barker, thanked the Committee for all their hard work and organisation during the past year.

Nigel Barker-Mills was well qualified

for his subject and for over 34 years has worked with English Heritage, and latterly Historic England, helping Surrey CC and other authorities to catalogue and preserve their heritage buildings. He started by relating how in the early 1980's before buildings were properly listed a celebrated historic building was due to be inspected and two days before the Inspector arrived the developer had knocked the building down! The authorities decided then that they would catalogue all the relevant buildings in the country within the next 3 years.

Why do we do it? The reasons were: Because it represents generations of achievement, it is an irreplaceable record of architecture to be handed on and they are a source of identity and pleasure. How do we do it? By the 1990 Act it is the duty of the Secretary of State for Culture Etc. advised by Historic England to maintain a National Heritage list of buildings of relevant importance. Application to be listed can be made online to Historic England and candidates that are accepted are visited by an Inspector from Historic England. Advice on whether to list is aiven according to several principles. How old is it? How rare is it?

About 500,000 buildings are listed in England, which is less than 5% of the total number. Of this about 2.5% are listed as Grade 1 and the rest are Grade 2 or less in importance.

WESTCOTT HISTORY GROUP (cont.)



Before 1700 the relevance of age, historical importance and rarity are factors taken into account. If it has a roof it is listed but if it hasn't it is a Scheduled Monument. If much restoration has been carried out it can be reduced to Grade 2.

- Guildford Castle and its Keeps.
- Church of St John the Baptist, W o t t o n . 13th century

Grade 2*.

- Dower House of Evelyn family. Restored 1871-82.
- Volvens, Ockley. Late 16th century. Example of Box framed architecture.

- Claremont House, Esher. It was

- replaced in 1770 by Lord Clive of India by a Palladian Manor.
- Claremont House Belvedere 1717. Built by Sir John Vanbrugh.

Grade 2* These are often barns but there are also mills.

- Shalford Mill. Built by John Mildred of Guildford
- Providence Chapel, Charlwood.
 Built around 1800 as a barracks in the Napoleonic War.
- Church of St Michael & All Angels, Pirbright. Rebuilt in 1784.
- Betchworth Castle. Remaining stable block built by Sir John Soane in 1799.
- The Tuns, Stane Street, Ockley, built circa 1720.

Buildings between 1850 and 1945 Grade 1.

- Church of St Mary, Holmbury St Mary. 1879 built by GE Street as a memorial

- Catholic Apostolic Cathedral, Albury. Built 1940 by William Mackintosh Brak and paid for by Drummond.

 celebrated architect of churches.

- Tigborne Court. Built 1899 – 1901 by Edward Lutyens for Sir Edgar Home MP for Guildford

- Horsley Towers East. Built 1820 -29 by Barry, extended 1847-60 in Rhenish style by 1st Earl Lovelace, son in law to Lord Byron.
- Goodwyns Place, Dorking. Built 1900 by Thackery Turner.
- Hope Mausoleum, Deepdene. Dorking. Built 1818 by William Atkinson for Hope's 7 year old son.
- Birds Eye Building, Walton-on-Thames. Built 1960-61 by Burnet Tate & Partners.

Modern Heritage Buildings less than 30 years old.

- Cemex House, Thorpe. Grade 2*. Built 1990 by Ted Cullinan - to be converted to

accommodation.

- Legal & General House, Lower Kingswood. Built 1986-91 by Arup Associates. Due to become accommodation for the elderly.
- Rodboro House, Guildford. Grade 2. Built 1902. First purpose built car factory in England/World.
- Watts Funerary Capel, Compton. Built

1896-98. The interior is Grade 1.

Surrey Surprises.

- Shah Jehan Building, Woking Built 1889. First purpose built mosque in England.
- Brookwood Necropolis. Largest cemetery in England founded 1852

by JC Loudon. This also includes the American Military Chapel – Brookwood Memorial 1957 opened by H.M The Queen.

- Woking Crematorium and Columbarium built in 1979.

Nigel Barker Mills had a fluent knowledge of these buildings and their whereabouts, often with anecdotes relating to their heritage. He pointed out that the value of a building is often enhanced by being listed but it is recognized that there is a cost incumbent on the owner in maintaining the building in a special way. It was remarkable tour de force and very well illustrated.

The next History Group meeting will be on Tuesday 12th November in the Westcott Reading Room at the usual time of 8pm for a lecture entitled Broadmoor & Lonesome Valley by Robin Daly.

Slow Cooked Pomegranate Ox Cheeks

2 ox cheeks, cut in half

100g plain flour

Freshly ground salt and pepper

1 onion

1 carrot

1 stick of celery

2 bay leaves

1 knob of butter

1 large glass of red wine

1.5 cups pomegranate juice

1 tbsp pomegranate molasses

Large glug of extra virgin olive oil

Method (Serves 2)

- Pat the ox cheeks dry with kitchen paper, then season with freshly ground salt and black pepper.
- Toss the cheeks in plain flour, then lightly sear in a pan with a glug of oil, on both sides until nicely browned, then remove from the pan.
- 3. Finely dice the onion, carrot and celery and sauté in a knob of butter on a medium heat for 6-7 minutes.
- 4. Place the onion, carrot and celery mixture and with the bay leaves into a slow cooker on a medium heat setting, followed by the ox cheeks, pomegranate juice, molasses and red wine.
- 5. Cook for six hours. (If cooking in an oven, cook at 150 degrees C for 4-5 hours)
- When ready, remove the ox cheeks from the slow cooker/oven, and loosely cover with foil to keep warm.
- Discard the bay leaves and transfer the liquid into a saucepan, bring to the boil and allow to reduce until it is syrupy. Stir regularly.
- Serve the ox cheeks with butternut squash mash and the reduced sauce drizzled on top, finished with some fresh pomegranate seeds.

WHAT IS OSTEOPATHY?

Osteopathy was founded in the late 1800's by Dr Andrew Taylor Still, who served as an army doctor during the American Civil War. Dissatisfied with the primitive surgical techniques and drugs of the day, he developed an approach to medicine which emphasised the importance of the correct alignment of the body, particularly the musculoskeletal system, in contributing to overall health.

Although osteopathy has previously been regarded as an alternative or complementary approach to healthcare, over time it has evolved into a modern and well regulated field of practice, being recognised by the NHS in 2017 as an Allied Health Profession, putting it alongside

occupational therapists, paramedics and radiographers, amongst others. Today, osteopaths train for 4 years at degree level, and must complete

over 1,000 hours of patient contact time before being allowed to register with the General Osteopathic Council and practice as an osteopath.

Osteopaths are trained to diagnose a wide variety of medical conditions, but their main focus is usually on the treatment of musculoskeletal problems. Although there is a perception that osteopaths only treat bad backs, this couldn't be further from the truth! Osteopaths work on many areas of the body

including: necks, shoulders, arms and hands, hips, knees and feet. They can also help with a range

of problems such as arthritis, sports injuries, muscle spasms or strains, tendinitis, or just general aches and pains. Most people choose to see an osteopath privately, with no need for a referral from their GP

So what do osteopaths actually do? Osteopathic treatment is very individual and is tailored to the patient to ensure they receive the most effective treatment approach for them. The osteopath may use a variety of techniques including manipulation, stretching or massage, which can improve the mobility of

the joints or spine, relieve muscular tension a n d enhance t h e

blood supply to tissues, all of which can help the natural healing mechanisms of the body. Osteopaths may also recommend exercises to be

performed at home, or provide advice on postural or lifestyle changes that can be made to assist with healing and to prevent problems returning.

In a study carried out for the General Osteopathic Council, 96% of patients reported being satisfied or very satisfied with their osteopathic care, while another study found that almost half of patients (47%) reported being much improved after just one osteopathic treatment. The National Institute for Health and Care Excellence (NICE) currently recommends manual therapy (which includes osteopathy) as part of an overall package for people with low back pain.

People often wonder if osteopathic treatment is painful. Any discomfort

during treatment is usually quite mild, most patients normally find that the treatment is relieving rather than painful. Sometimes there can be a mild ache or muscle soreness for a little while afterwards, but this generally goes away quickly; serious side-effects from osteopathic treatment are very rare.

Another question that osteopaths hear frequently is: "what's the difference between osteopathy, chiropractic

and physiotherapy?". There are undoubtedly some areas of overlap between the three professions, but as a generalisation: physiotherapists may put more emphasis on corrective exercise, chiropractors will frequently focus more on the spine, while

osteopaths try to take a more holistic view and consider the functioning of the entire body - quite often the place that it hurts isn't the underlying cause of the problem!



Village Hall and Doctor's surgery in the village. This will not be easy but we are confident that with everyone's support a positive outcome can be achieved.

WVA Draft New Constitution

We are hopeful that the Charity Commission will have worked through the backlog of applications and we will have started the process of approving the new constitution by the time this article is published in October; if we have, we will update you at the AGM.

The Crown and Indigo Spice Properties

A formal Planning Application (conforming with our Westcott Neighbourhood Development Plan) has been submitted by The Crown Public House for 7 dwellings (and 14 parking spaces) on the site, which the Village Association has supported.

The Indigo Spice planning appeal was turned down, and the Village Association has approached the owner to ask for the appearance of the empty site to be improved so that it is less of an eye-sore on entering the village from the west. Their response has been to put in another planning application (MO/2019/1452) for two dwellings and two parking spaces; this however still does not conform to the Neighbourhood Development plan and we await the outcome.

Church Bank

The church has now cleared the bank

below Holy Trinity of the bracken and brambles and reseeded the area with environmentally friendly grasses and wild flowers to attract pollinating insects. The rhododendron bushes have been reduced in height to allow sight of the church and by next spring the whole area will have been transformed.

Prudential Ride London

The WVA has approached Prudential Ride London (PRL) about registering with them as a charity and securing places on the Classic 100 Ride for 2020. The aim would be to have a village draw for any places we secured, the successful applicants raising money for the Village



Association and their chosen charity. A representative of PRL has been invited to come to our **Open Meeting in December (Wednesday 12th at 7.30pm)** to speak about the race, its organisation and its future, and answer any questions. Please make a note in your diaries.

What to do if a fire breaks out in your home

Whether the fire has been discovered by you or your smoke alarm, stay calm and put your Home Fire Action Plan into action.

- Raise the alarm.
- Shout to wake everyone up, get everyone together, and make your way out by the quickest route. This should be by the front door.
- Do not investigate the fire.

- Do not open any doors other than ones which you need to escape through. Check doors with the back of your hand; if they are warm it means the fire is on the other side, so do not open them.
- If there is smoke, crawl along with your nose near to the floor where the air will be cleaner.

Once everyone is out of the house call the Fire Service on 999 from a call box or neighbour's house. Do not go back in until the Fire Service tell you it is safe.

infections, problems in the abdomen such as burst ulcers, or minor skin injuries like cuts and bites.



Visit to Osborne House 22 July 2019

We had been promised a day of 27 degrees, and it did materialise, but not before the 45 of us had shivered in shirtsleeves on our crossing to the Isle of Wight.



The much loved holiday home of Queen Victoria and Prince Albert looked slightly austere with its Italianate style, but the view was wonderful, and Dorking's own Thomas Cubitt had followed his patrons' instructions, and inside, created a home that managed to combine spaciousness and a feeling of a relaxed family escape.

The cosiness was aided by the Victorian clutter, mainly 19th century bronzes and other sculptures, pictures, and furniture that were birthday presents from Victoria and Albert to each other. Particularly atmospheric were the study with 2 desks where Victoria and Albert worked side by side, [his slightly smaller!], the nursery with 3 identical cots to accommodate 3 of the 9 children, and Victoria's bedroom where she died in 1901 surrounded by

her children and grandchildren.

In addition to the main house, there was the beach where the Queen's bathing machine was on show, and children were playing, just as the royal children did over a century ago. The scene resembled an impressionist painting, with the odd modern addition such as a large container ship.

But the place that really emphasized the importance of the family for Victoria, and especially Albert, was Swiss Cottage, built in its own grounds in chalet style to give the children a taste of their father's happy childhood in Germany. One could almost feel the childrens' presence, especially in the kitchen where they practiced cooking, the very well organised little museum, and the 9 individual childrens' gardens, where they were encouraged to grow produce that their father would buy from them at market price, an approach that chimes with priorities today!

Some comments on the coach home: "very engaging, helpful, and knowlegable staff", "English Heritage maintains the grounds and gardens beautifully","A really enjoyable day out". A big thank you to our expert driver Simon, and organisers Sue, Sheila, Deanne and Sally.



Reallocation of Dr Guilder's registered patients

You may be aware that in October 2018 Dorking Medical Practice merged with Dr Tom Guilder's practice in Westcott. Dr Guilder retired from the merged practice in the Summer of this year and I am sure you will join us in thanking him for his long and dedicated service to the NHS.

The transition from a long-serving family doctor is always difficult and ever since the merger of practices we have been in the process of harmonising cultures between our three sites (New House Surgery, Dorking; Hillside Surgery, Boxhill; Riverbank Surgery, Westcott), whilst at the same time retaining focus on holistic and evidence based medical care.

If your registered GP was Dr Guilder, we are in the process of allocating you another named GP. They will have overall administrative responsibility for the care and support that our surgery provides to you. This does not prevent you from seeing any GP in the practice as you currently do, as all your medical notes are available to all of our clinicians.

You do not need to take any further action, but if you have any questions, or wish to discuss this further with us, please contact us on 01306 875577 (Riverbank Surgery) or 01306

Quick Q&A

Q: Will Riverbank surgery still be able to dispense medication to me?

A: Yes – if Dr Guilder was able to dispense to you prior to the merger, then Dorking Medical Practice will also be able to do the same.

Q: Why has it taken so long to inform me of my new named GP?

A: We apologise for any inconvenience this may have caused. Dr Guilder formally retired from the practice at the end of June 2019 and then carried out some ad hoc shifts in July and August. The process of transferring the 2000 patients allocated to him has to be done manually on the computer system and is being done as a matter of priority by our administrative team.

Q: Do I have to see my named GP?

A: Your named GP is for administrative purposes only, and you are free to see any GP of your choice. Having a named GP helps the practice equally distribute administrative workload to the clinicians.

Q: Is the surgery doing anything to help with continuity of care and familiarity?

A: Yes – Doctors Dhoul, Loveless and Qureshi will be carrying out the majority of the clinics at Riverbank Surgery. We have 12 GPs in total and in case of annual leave or sickness, our other GPs will provide clinical cover. All our consultations are recorded electronically and so whichever GP you see will have access to your full medical records.

Q: How is Dorking Medical Practice regulated?

A: We are regulated by the Care Quality Commissioner (CQC) and we are proud to announce that following a full inspection in July this year, we were rated as Good across all assessed parameters.

Q: What services can I expect at Dorking Medical Practice?

A: We provide the full range of General Practice services across all 3 of our sites. We are fortunate to have an experienced clinical team consisting of 12 GPs (4 GP partners and 8 Associate GPs), 4 Practice nurses, 3 Healthcare Assistants and 1 Phlebotomist. We are also able to offer advice and appointments with our inhouse Musculoskeletal Practitioners, Clinical Pharmacists and Midwife

Q: Do you provide any other medical services?

A: We are also able to offer the following enhanced services:

- Extended hours (evening and

weekend surgeries) – available Monday to Friday 6.30pm to 9pm, Saturday 9am to 1pm, and Sunday 9am to 1pm. You will either be offered an appointment with a GP or nurse at our main site in Dorking or another practice within Dorking.

- Specialist clinics in Contraception and Gynaecology
- Access to GPs with specialist interests in Cardiology, Dermatology and Diabetes.
- In-house specialist Diabetic Nurse
- In-house specialist Respiratory Nurse for Asthma and COPD
- In-house wound specialist Nurse
- Travel clinic, family planning services and childhood immunisations
- The practice is also involved in running the local rehabilitation ward in Dorking Hospital and leads on the Community Medical Team

Q: I have heard that you are a GP Training practice, what does this mean?

A: We are committed to the education of future doctors. This requires us to achieve specific performance indicators that demonstrate high quality standards of medical care. We currently have two GP Trainees, both of whom are fully qualified doctors and are supervised by more experienced GPs within the practice.

Living beyond our means

Have you heard of Earth Overshoot Day? This is the day of the year on which humans have used up 100% of that year's supply of natural resources. For the rest of the year, the way we live means that we will be consuming more resources than the planet can generate annually.



In 1970 Earth Overshoot Day was 23rd December, this year it was 29th July - meaning that for the remaining five months of 2019 we are living in ecological debt.

Although undoubtedly population growth is a factor, an important dimension is that certain countries consume more of the planets resources than others. If everyone lived as we do in Europe, Earth Overshoot Day would have been May 10th. This surely signals that something is very wrong.

Overconsumption uses up natural

resources and releases waste - primarily carbon dioxide - into the atmosphere. This in turn leads to increasing deforestation, biodiversity loss, water scarcity, air pollution and climate breakdown.



Who pays the price of our ecological debt? It will be our children and is already those in developing countries, who are becoming increasingly vulnerable to extreme weather events – causing droughts, flooding and food shortages.

Action from national governments is needed but we can take responsibility, as individuals, to live with more care. To stop buying things that we really don't need, to look after the things we have, to make them last longer, and to re-purpose or recycle our waste as much as possible.

DORKING MUSEUM



RESPONSIBLE DOG WALKING

Dog poop, the brown stuff, droppings, faeces - yep, it's the dreaded act that any dog owner has to partake in when out with their pets, picking it up or generally ignoring the entire process.

I myself am a dog owner, and I take full responsibility for picking up my dogs' droppings, although it is not up there on my list of favourite things to do while out on my evening walk. Recently, while out saying hello to passers-by, there has been some discussion that finding doggy bags hung on gates and left on the floor are not necessarily an act of goodwill! Myself and other countryside lovers can't seem to understand that if some dog owners make the effort to pick up their dogs' poo, why won't they dispose of it efficiently?

Understandably, a lot of dog poo bags are advertised as biogradeable, so it doesn't appear on the surface that anyone is harming the environment, but sadly, wildlife could still be prone to digesting these bags and like all plastic bags, they can take years to decompose, some even up to 100 years. Not to mention that they are an eyesore and one of the most single frustrating things to pass while out on a walk as it doesn't quite make sense how leaving a bag of poo amongst the countryside means that it is picked up?

A good example that I saw of this myself was an early morning walk I did

not so long ago with my husband and our three dogs. We were approaching a kissing gate near the National Trust office in Westcott and from afar we saw a fluorescent pink object hanging from a gate. As we approached, I was surprised to see it was actually a dog poo bag! A BRIGHT PINK dog poo bag! Not only was it left on the gate irresponsibly, but it looked like it was flagging up a sporting event! When did dog poo bags become so fashionably colourful!?



The law states that if caught, anyone can openly be fined up to £50-£80 on the spot if they let their dog foul in public areas. This also includes purposely not carrying any doggy bags with them. However, exceptions are made for rural and agriculture areas. So quite simply, if you are going to pick up your dogs' poo, take the bag HOME with you and dispose of it in a suitable dog bin or push it to one side of the sidewalk so that it is out of the way. This way dog
