THE BOOK OF REVELATION, THE CLIMATE EMERGENCY AND THE END TIMES

"Wrath is poured out on the land and ugly and painful sores break out on the people...every living thing in the sea died...the rivers and springs of water became blood...the sun was given power to scorch people with fire. They were seared by the intense heat."

These visions from the Book of Revelation(Chapter

16), sound eerily like the worst predictions of what may happen to our earth this century if Climate Change is

not abated. Revelation sees these outcomes as being the result of idolatry – refusing to put God first. Revelationgoesontopicturetheresult of putting other gods first; if Mammon - wealth, money - is the god of your culture, it will eventually collapse. John, the writer of Revelation sees that all are intoxicated in such a society, unable to do the things needed for stability: "all the nations have drunk the maddening wine of her adulteries. The kings of the earth committed adultery with her, and the merchants of the earth grew rich from her excessive luxuries." 18.3. When collapse comes, it can all seem to happen so fast; "In one hour such great wealth has been brought to ruin." 18.17

I do not know if these prophecies of collapse and ruination are especially relevant today. Are these the end times? There has been speculation about the end of the world throughout history, sometimes speculation based on a misuse of Revelation. However there is something different today about the threat of Climate Change and general ecological ruination. Unlike previous prophesies of 'the end of the world', the predictions of what Climate Change is likely to do are not based on speculation but rather science that has existed

for at least 40 years. Science that tells us we are heading towards cataclysmic disaster. Furthermore, we have a rapacious economic

system that we all seem locked into, apparently unable to escape.

So, what are we to do? What are we to do as we accelerate towards climate and ecological disaster? Firstly, it is clear, we have to change. We have to free ourselves from "the maddening wine of the adulteries" of our economic system. We have to

change individually, and we have to work for change politically. We have, in the words of our Archbishop Justin Welby, to "Dethrone Mammon". We have to reconfigure our economic system so that all enjoy the essential benefits, without the excesses that are simply unsustainable. Individually we have to do what our Eco Group tells us - fly less (Jenny and I have decided not to fly at all) and, more generally we have to consume less and we have to be engaged politically to bring the changes that only governments can.

We will be enabled to do all these things by focussing on the second area of what we need to do – be a people who know we cannot serve God and Mammon, a people who know that life can only be found in

Christ. We have to go deeper into Christ who, as Revelation tells us, is the Alpha and the Omega, the Beginning and the End, the Lamb on whom all depends, the Lamb worshipped by "a great multitude that no-one could count". We have to live in His glory, as citizens of His heaven, empowered by His Spirit, confident that even in great trauma, even in the "End Times", God is ever present and, in Christ, His Kingdom will come.

WESTCOTT HISTORY GROUP



There was no meeting in October to report and the next meeting will be on Tuesday 12th November with a Talk by Robin Daly entitled 'Broadmoor & Lonesome Valley' in the Reading Room at the usual time of 8 pm.

During the past month some of the committee met with Jane le Cluse, Archivist of Dorking Museum, to discuss archiving of our WLHG material. She kindly offered to take the WLHG collection of School Log Books and deposit them at the Surrey History Centre in Woking, where they should be. There were 14 books dating from 23/1/1874 to 31/7/2001 for Abinger Common School and for Westcott which had two schools – Infant and Junior – dating from 2/10/1882 to 24/3/1988 and from 11/7/1863 to 4/4/1941 respectively, relating the activities of the school during those periods.

The Dorking Museum hoped to have an increased capacity in the near future and would be happy to take over any material that did not duplicate their own. We are busy cataloguing in detail the maps held in the Reading Room with a view to storing them in Dorking Museum eventually as the plans for a new Community centre may not cater for the WLHG storage in the future.

Slow Cooked Pomegranate Ox Cheeks

2 ox cheeks, cut in half

100g plain flour

Freshly ground salt and pepper

1 onion

1 carrot

1 stick of celery

2 bay leaves

1 knob of butter

1 large glass of red wine

1.5 cups pomegranate juice

1 tbsp pomegranate molasses

Large glug of extra virgin olive oil

Method (Serves 2)

- Pat the ox cheeks dry with kitchen paper, then season with freshly ground salt and black pepper.
- Toss the cheeks in plain flour, then lightly sear in a pan with a glug of oil, on both sides until nicely browned, then remove from the pan.
- 3. Finely dice the onion, carrot and celery and sauté in a knob of butter on a medium heat for 6-7 minutes.
- 4. Place the onion, carrot and celery mixture and with the bay leaves into a slow cooker on a medium heat setting, followed by the ox cheeks, pomegranate juice, molasses and red wine.
- 5. Cook for six hours. (If cooking in an oven, cook at 150 degrees C for 4-5 hours)
- When ready, remove the ox cheeks from the slow cooker/oven, and loosely cover with foil to keep warm.
- Discard the bay leaves and transfer the liquid into a saucepan, bring to the boil and allow to reduce until it is syrupy. Stir regularly.
- Serve the ox cheeks with butternut squash mash and the reduced sauce drizzled on top, finished with some fresh pomegranate seeds.

WESTCOTT BRIDGE CLUB AT 25





Did you know that we have a friendly duplicate bridge club in Westcott?

Perhaps you are wondering if playing at a club is for you. Why not come along? We meet every Monday evening in the Reading Room. If you don't have a partner let us know and we'll try to find you one.

This season, the club is celebrating 25 years since its formation back in 1995. It began with a group of friends led by Nora Hillson playing once a fortnight in an annexe of Garden Cottage in Stones Lane, Westcott.

As the club became more popular, more space was needed and so in 2005 the club moved to the Reading Rooms and began a weekly meeting of its members. Today, the club exceeds 70 members, mostly from Westcott, Dorking and Westhumble.

We play an average of 21 hands each Monday evening, beginning at 19:30 sharp and finishing around 22:15 including a refreshment break of 15 minutes with a wide selection of beverages and some say, the best biscuits of any bridge club in the district!

We like to describe ourselves as competitive but friendly and invite new members to come along for three sessions before committing to membership.

Naturally, we play duplicate bridge each evening although at Christmas we let our hair down and play a rotating Chicago, which given the free-flowing alcohol and canapes is probably sensible! During the Christmas session we organise a raffle and give the proceeds to a local charity.

We end the season in July with a prizegiving evening where there are cups to be won and some token prizes for those pairs who during the season managed to both bid and make a slam which no other pair achieved on a given hand.

Annual Membership is £10 a season (September-July) with a joining fee of a further £15. Table money is £3 a session per person.

FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE HOSPICE



Florence Nightingale Hospice Charity recognises Christmas can be a very emotional occasion and hosts two Tree of Light events which are open to all, regardless of religion or spirituality, and whether or not your loved one was cared for at the Hospice or elsewhere.

"The Tree of Light events are designed to give people a space where a part of the season is set aside to remember and reflect on loved ones," says Ann Kenny, the Bereavement Support Team Lead at the Hospice. "Christmas can often be a time of conflicting emotions, or it can be so busy that those who are grieving can't find a time to process feelings of sadness which may come to the fore at this time of year."

This year's Aylesbury Tree of Light event has moved indoors for 2019 and will take place at Aylesbury High School on Walton Road on Sunday 1st December at 5pm. It will also have a change of format, with more secular readings and music, rather than carols and prayers.

"We are aware that many of our families are not Christians and may prefer something less religious but still thoughtful and meditative," says Vicky James, Events and Community Manager. "There are lots of other poems and readings which bring comfort, and beautiful music apart

from carols, so we are trying something new to see what people think."

The Buckingham Tree of Light event will take place on Saturday 14th December from 5pm at St Peter and St Paul's Church, Castle Street and will retain its more traditional feel, with prayers, readings and carols, so the Charity hopes that there is something for everyone in the two events.

As well as attending the Tree of Light events, you can also sponsor a light in memory of loved ones and write a dedication which will appear in the Books of Honour which can be viewed at the Hospice in December and early January, and at the two Tree of Light events.

Your Village Association – New Constitution

At the AGM in October we were able to share with everyone the new Constitution approved by the Charity Commission.

There had been some disagreement on the wording of Clause 3 (the Association's Objectives) which we were able to resolve by assuring the Charity Commission that the Association would conduct its business exclusively for the public benefit and for charitable purposes in accordance with the laws of England and Wales.

The wording of Clause 3 has therefore been changed from that published after the consultation in the autumn of last year. Nothing other than Clause 3 has been changed. A copy of the new Constitution can be found on the WVA website. Our Charity Number is now 1185622

The Wotton Estate has also agreed to plant a mixed species hedge along the length of the parking area to try to screen cars parked here from the road. We would remind residents however, that this is private land and that parking is only permitted when the church is being used on a Sunday or for other services/meetings.

Box Hill to Leith Hill Off-Road Cycling Route

Surrey County Council, in partnership with the Surrey Hills AONB, has put in a bid for the development of a 15k off-road multi-user route between Box Hill and Leith Hill via Denbies Wine Estate, Dorking, Westcott, and Coast Hill Farm at Wotton.



The proposed plans will include a Cycle Hub with café, toilets and

showers, a cycle repair shop, and parking for up to 70 vehicles all contained within existing buildings on the existing site of the Business Park.

If the bid and development plans are approved this will undoubtedly provide parking for visitors to the area who have in the past been minded to park their cars for long periods of the day in the village.

If you are a resident who is, or has been, impacted by visitor parking outside your house, I am sure that you will want to follow developments closely. When the Planning Application for the Coast Hill Farm Cycle Hub is made, we will publish the details on the WVA web-site.

As always, you are invited to write to me on issues which concern you, and the WVA will do their best to address them.

Thank you to all of you who attended our Open Meetings and the AGM which are an important way for the WVA to stay connected to what you as residents want for your village.



THE PAST IS A FOREIGN COUNTRY: THEY DO THINGS DIFFERENTLY THERE



"You ask me to tell you about the great events that happened fifty years ago."

This is the introduction to 'The Battle of Dorking', a short story written in 1871 by George Chesney, recalling for his grandchildren an invasion of England by Germany. It was a work of fiction, of course, but is recognised today as an important example of what came

to be known 'invasion literature'; an influential precursor of science fiction.

The author was a Captain in the Royal Engineers who was concerned about the state of Britain's armed forces. He used fiction as a device to promulgate his views after letters and journalism on the issue had failed to impact on the public

consciousness.



In the story, the enemy advanced towards London whilst a disorganised army struggled to mount an effective defence. Westcott does not get a specific mention but much of the action takes place in the vicinity, including the confrontation close by Box Hill that gives the book its title.

The story caught the public imagination and was translated into a score of languages. There was no immediate military response but in the 1880 forts were erected on Box Hill and Ranmore.

This month though, there is a need to stress how to safely make

the most of our wonderful local environment. One of the big benefits of the Walking for Health scheme is that you are accompanied by other likeminded folks.

I have recently learnt a personal lesson

about this – walking in the hills on my own, I lost my footing and somehow managed to chip a bone in my ankle and one in my foot. I then had to get myself back to



somewhere I could get picked up.

One of the up sides of the hills where we live is the ability to use them to improve our own mental health, to get a bit of solitary space to think and unwind. If you are going out on your own, take a phone and tell someone roughly where you are going and when you expect to be back. If you can find someone to go with you then that's probably the best option.

Your councillor has learnt his lesson.

Preparing for EU Exit

Mole Valley District Council have asked all councillors to explain to residents how best to prepare for EU Exit. Obviously, just like preparing for heavy winter weather or a heatwave, what follows is precautionary and nothing more than contingency planning.

By the time you read this, you'll know whether the UK is leaving on 31st October, with or without a deal. Either way, at the October Full Council meeting, officials were keen to stress the level of preparation that has gone in towards keeping local services running whatever the eventuality. Mole Valley is working in partnership with Surrey County Council, the NHS and other local authorities so that the response is completely joined up.

There is information available online that will be useful for Westcott residents who are EU Citizens (or from Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway or Switzerland), to enable them to continue living in the UK after the UK leaves the European Union.

It is important that everyone who needs to, applies for EU Settled Status, as their application will give them the immigration status they need to continue to work, live and study in the UK. Applicants will then be eligible for public services such as healthcare and schools, pubic funds and pensions and be able to apply for British Citizenship (if eligible).



It is free to apply and can be completed online at EU settlement scheme. If residents are unable to go online themselves they can call 03333 445 675 for assistance with their application.

If Mole Valley is to be better than Carbon Neutral, our recycling needs to include much more of a focus on stripping items back to their component parts and seeing what can be safely put to other uses in our homes.



determined users accessing them. Across the village we occasionally see gates being removed so that others can access them.

This is really one complicated case of Paper – Scissors – Stone. Dog walkers are supposed to keep their charges on a lead but complain when their free roaming pets are frightened by cyclists. Young children on their bikes on the cycle path complain when dogs are overly interested in them.

The only conclusion seems to be that everyone using our countryside access paths should respect others doing the same. Where you see this level of respect not being shown, please do report it by calling 101, or if folks are getting aggressive and you think someone is in danger then call 999.

Respect is the first part of the Countryside Code:



Respect other people: consider the local community and other people enjoying the outdoors, leave gates

and property as you find them and follow paths unless wider access is available.

Protect the natural environment: leave no trace of your visit and take your litter home.

Keep dogs under effective control.

Enjoy the outdoors: plan ahead and be prepared, follow advice and local signs.

The Code tells Countryside users to remember their actions can affect people's lives and livelihoods. Consider the local community and other people enjoying the outdoors.

Respect the needs of local people and visitors alike – for example, don't block gateways, driveways or other paths with your vehicle. When riding a bike or driving a vehicle, slow down or stop for horses, walkers and farm animals and give them plenty of room. By law, cyclists must give way to walkers and horse-riders on bridleways.

Co-operate with people at work in the countryside. For example, keep out of the way when farm animals are being gathered or moved and follow directions from the farmer.

Lullingstone Castle

On a rather unsettled Thursday, we set off on our trip to Kent, to enjoy a full and varied day at Lullingstone. We were met at the Castle by our guide and after coffee we visited the historic church on the estate, intriguing details there, very old stained glass windows (put in by Flemish glaziers) and a wooden and marble font. There were impressive tombs and memorials of the Hart-Dyke family who still own the estate; also a modern tapestry woven locally for the millennium, with wool from their own sheep.



The Castle is really a magnificent manor house, but has a homely, family feel about it, as the Hart-Dyke family are still in residence.

We admired the beautiful dining room, the glass and the porcelain, the cosy library with comfy settees and of course, books (I would have liked time to browse in there!). Our guide told us about the portraits, and amusing anecdotes about the family, their friendship with Queen Anne (the difficulties of having her staying with them) and the part that the house

played during the war, with the RAF much involved. We were also told about the former silk-worm farm.

Then, with pride and enthusiasm from Tom Hart-Dyke, we were guided around the world in the gardens. Starting with a trio of huge old Cedar trees, we visited many countries, merging into each other, often, with trees flying flags to orientate us. We did have one short downpour in this time but fortunately we were under cover in the polytunnel gazing at the most amazing collection of cactil have ever seen!

After an excellent lunch, we visited nearby Lullingstone Roman Villa. The first indication of this important site was some 80 years ago and it has been worked on ever since that time. I am not good with dates, but apparently, the villa was lived in from 100AD (changed and altered) until 400AD. The whole detailed ground floor plan was there, with some of the floors tessellated, and a wonderful complete mosaic. There were many artefacts to see, such as jewellery and tools, looking very similar to the ones we have today. The bones and human remains, especially of a tiny baby, I found very poignant.

Our journey home was smooth with our excellent driver. Many thanks to our organisers and planners, for a full and interesting day.



RESTORATION OF THE POUND

Village Pound Restoration

After many months of delay, I am pleased to report that work on the repair and restoration of the north wall of the village pound is now complete. In my previous article in the June magazine you may recall that the wall was in a very poor condition due to many years of neglect, and was in serious danger of total collapse. The wall had developed an alarming lean and was also bowing outwards, so it was decided that it was necessary to dismantle the wall completely and then to rebuild it. This was not as straightforward as it sounds.

The pound is part of Wotton Estate owned by Lord Evelyn, and is a grade two listed structure, dating from the late medieval period around the 16th or 17th century, although the exact date of construction is not known. Any work to the pound has to be done in strict accordance with the rules and conditions regarding any restoration of a listed historic building.

The wall was coated in a special adhesive, similar to wallpaper paste,

and then each brick and stone had an individual numbered I a b e I attached to identify its



orignal position in the wall. They even marked the labels with arrows showing which was the top or bottom, such was the attention to detail. The wall was the extensivly photographed so it was possible to know where every stone went when re-construction began. As you can imagine, this was a painstaking and laborious job in itself.

Once the work began of carefully removing the material they were stored until the foundations were reached. This was when the cause of the lean was revealed – there were no foundations! The wall had been built on compacted soil and the situation was compounded by the fact that it was not tied-in to the adjacent east wall, as this was where the entrance gate was, so the north wall was unsupported. It was necessary to provide a solid foundation and when this was done work begun on reconstruction.

I was extremely privilaged to be granted access to see the project deveolp from start to finish, and am grateful to the two craftsmen, Will and Aldis,



who kept me informed as work progressed and explained to me the various stages in detail. I was impressed by the skills of these two artisans, using

techniques and methods unchanged for centuries; (apart from a cement mixer) even the colour of the lime morter was much debated and after experimenting with various colours and textures, the right morter mix was agreed.

The laborious work of rebuilding the wall began using the photos to position the bricks and stones back in their original position. The whole project took 6 weeks to complete and fortunately the weather conditions were perfect. During the rebuild, the original gate bolt receiver was found, a hollow metal tube that the bolt slid into, and this was reinstated, what was facinating was the discovery of two coins. One was a Victorian penny dated 1899 and even more exciting was a George III Britannia coin dated 1799.

I have spoken to George Chapman who is acting agent and responsible for historic buildings on the Wotton estate about the possibility of installing a gate to the pound to deter any possible vandalism and anti-social behaviour occuring, and he has agreed to look into this. He has also had a membrane installed covering the inside to supress any weeds and brambles from causing damage to the structure and to finally cover it with a layer of gravel.

On behalf of the village of Westcott, I would like to thank Mr Evelyn, George Chapman, Will and Aldis for their efforts in restoring a much loved feature of our village.

Did you Know?

During WW2, The local children would collect waste paper, scrap metal and anything that could be recycled for the war effort and place it in the pound which had been given a temporarty corrugated iron roof to cover it.

The Westcott road sweeper, Abe

Wright, would store his handcart, broom and shovel in the pound. He kept the Westcott roads spotlessly clean, and woe betide anyone who he saw drop any litter, not that anyone did then, How I wish it was like that today.





Hatching grass snakes!

A couple of months ago I became the responsible parent of 15 grass snake eggs that had unfortunately been disturbed from a compost heap where they had been laid.

The eggs, which I must confess I have never seen before were strange indeed - not like an egg as I knew it. They were quite soft, had a leather-like feel to them and some were stuck together in a small cluster. Not able to return them I took on the task of 'Hatcher of Eggs'.

I did some research but there wasn't really much information out there and tended towards complicated and expensive incubators. In the end I found a suitable plastic container that I used to rear some baby mice a while back (that's another story!!) and filled it with some composting material and buried the eggs.

Our office (an old farm) is a constant

temperature in the summer – not too warm or too hot, so I decided to leave them there and wait. To be honest I wasn't hopeful!

A week went by but no sign of life – I checked them every day and made sure the compost remained damp and then one day when I was away from the office I got a text from a colleague 'one of your grass snakes has hatched!', I instantly felt like a proud mummy.

I released the perfectly formed little grass snake near our pond - grass snakes are immediately independent from birth. The pond (due to our management) is a perfect place for them, compost heaps, dead wood piles, lots of cover and a plentiful supply of food.

Fascinating Fungi

Having recently been working in the woods it's hard to miss all the amazing fungi that is fruiting.

Fungi are not plants, and neither are they animals. Unlike plants, which convert the sun's energy into food, fungi feed on other plant and animal material and do not need sunlight; they use enzymes to dissolve their food before they absorb it.

The fungi that we commonly identify as mushrooms or toadstools are in fact the short-lived fruiting bodies of fungi preparing to release their spores. The rest of the fungus is made up of a mycelium, or web, of fine threads in the soil, tree or dead leaves.

All mushrooms are fungi but not all fungi are mushrooms. The kingdom of Fungi also includes yeasts, slime molds, rusts and several other types of related organisms.

The mycelium of a single fungus can be huge – a honey fungus found in America, which infects trees, was thought to be between 2,400 and 8,500 years old and covered about 10 square kilometres of the forest.

The top of a mushroom is called the cap – inside are gills, where it produces spores, instead of seeds.



Stinkhorn

Some mushrooms can release 2.7 billion spores a day. Other mushrooms, like the stinkhorns, smell of rotting meat – this attracts flies, which then carry the spores away.

Many people are fascinated by mushrooms because some are edible but beware some are deadly poisonous, and some have hallucinogenic properties.

The edible mushroom is very nutritious. Differing species can be a good source of vitamin B along with essential minerals such as copper and potassium. While the fat, carbohydrates and salt content is very low. A single Portabella

mushroom can contain more potassium than a banana!

There are plenty of books on how to identify edible mushrooms, but only ever eat a mushroom if you are certain of its identity and that it is safe.

One of our deadliest fungi is the death cap. This fungus has a plain appearance and looks very similar to many edible mushrooms, but it hides a nasty secret. It contains a high concentration of poisonous amatoxin, which breaks down the enzymes responsible for your cell metabolism. That can be fatal, so best all round to avoid this one!

Fungi also have many other uses. The razor-strop is a common bracket fungus and when dried out, can be used to sharpen blades and was once used by watchmakers to polish moving components. It also has antibacterial properties.

Before the invention of synthetic dyes, mushrooms were widely used for dyeing wool and other natural fibres. Mushroom dyes are organic compounds and produce strong, vivid colours.

it can be shown, or intuition shows, that the numbers in the bracket add to 2 (at most). In other words, even with infinitely many people to count they do 2\7 of the job in one hour, so they will do the whole job in 7\2 hours. That's three hours and thirty minutes.

The second part is a little more tricky. Note 1/7 (1+1/2+1/4+1/8+...)

One way to tackle this is to consider how much work they can do together in one hour. The first person 1/28. Added these together gives 1/4, in other hour, together they can do 1/4 of the job in one hour, so the whole job takes 4 hours.
