EASTER: JESUS THE KING – OF EVERYTHING

Apparently, in the 100 Years War, the English soldiers used to shout "The pope is French, but Jesus Christ is English." Perhaps an apt quote in these days of Brexit. More to the point, the sentiment shows how tempting it is to try to fit Jesus into our own LET GO OF Ye image. We probably CONCEIT AN

don't think today that Jesus Christ is an Englishman, but nonetheless we may want to make Him fit with our perceptions and lifestyle. LET GO OF YOUR PRIDE, ANY CONCEIT, AND JUST GIVE IN; LIVE AS A SUBJECT OF THE KINGDOM OF GOD, KNOWING JESUS' POWER OVER ALL...

We may want to box Jesus into something like being a "Good Moral Teacher" or we may respect Him for His good life and kind deeds - a Jesus that we can admire, and then leave aside to get on with our lives. But, the Jesus of the Bible does not allow us to



do this. The Jesus of the Bible is King – King of everything: "life, art, the universe, justice, death, money.... politics, philosophy, culture..." – in the words of Tom Wright, Bible scholar. We can try to make Jesus less than this, but we will always be conflicted if we ignore the reality that He has established.


The Christian faith tells us that God's Kingdom comes through God being man. A man who contrary to all the expectations of Jesus' day, was a man of humility, of humble service.

> God eschews the ways of domination and power. He shows that to be fully human means to be humble. This is how evil is overcome – by Jesus, fully human, confronting the

bastions of power of Evil.

In the events of Holy Week, Jesus cries out in bitter anguish, "Father, if you are willing, take this cup from me". But the cup could not be taken. Evil must do its worst. Jesus experiences all of the forces of the Devil ... the forces of anxiety, of being overwhelmed, betrayal, being completely let down, ridicule, torture, false accusation, misunderstanding, rejection, agonizing pain, abandonment, and the final enemy ... death. The Devil arrays Jesus with all the powers of Sin and Death ... and loses. God in Jesus accepts it all, bears the wounds ... and brings Resurrection. This is the

King we worship today ... a King who was fully human, who was humble, who suffered, who loved, who brings the mighty power of Resurrection.

This is a story so beyond imagination, you couldn't make it up, so beyond the Jewish expectations in first century Israel/Palestine; that God should live as man, suffer and die would not, could not have occurred to anyone. And the account confounds all of the societal mores of the Roman Empire or, indeed any Empire/society up to that time - that to be fully human is not about power, force, coercion, wealth, self-indulgence was beyond understanding. The very idea of "humility" would have been anathema. The late American psychiatrist and author M.Scott Peck came to Christian faith in his adult years, being baptised at the age of 43. When he was exploring faith, he first read the Gospels sceptically but he said: "I discovered a man

so incredibly real that no one could have made him up."

Jesus the King, who you couldn't make up. And, as King, Jesus makes demands that only God makes. He tells us to "take up our own cross, and follow Him", giving over our lives that we may find Life. He calls us to be subjects to His Lordship, to Him as King.

I pray that you will know the joy of so doing. Do not try the impossible in reducing Jesus to being "a good moral teacher". Let go of your pride, any conceit, and just give in; live as a subject of the Kingdom of God, knowing Jesus' power over all manifestations of evil, know His love, His forgiveness, acceptance.

A wet, windy night on March 4th saw a good turnout of members despite the weather, and the effort was well worthwhile! Before the main talk of the evening, we had a short introduction by Justine Webber, one of Darcy Bussell's instructors, who is keen to start a Zumba class in the village. This was followed by an extremely interesting presentation by Hannah Mayo who covered the subject of climate change, and what we can do to rectify some of the mistakes made since the industrial revolution! Although Hannah leads the ECO Church team, this is something that everyone needs to do, whatever their beliefs. There were some references to the Church and how religion overlaps with the need to make changes, but we need to think about our neighbours, not just here in the Surrey Hills but across the planet, of those who are being devastatingly and disproportionately affected, right now.

Her presentation was well prepared with statistics, with 2019 being the



second hottest year in earth's recorded history there's a very high chance of ecosystems being threatened, coral die off, arctic ice sheets melting, coastal flooding, and generally more extreme weather events more often. Add to this food insecurity....climate refugees.... water scarcity....drought....air pollution and it is obvious that this all needs to be addressed in positive ways. Some of her suggestions were in our everyday lives, from recycling and avoiding single use plastics, to buying fewer clothes and cutting down on car and plane travel.



THE HUT & THE READING ROOM UPDATE

Statement on behalf of the Trustees of The Hut, the Trustees of the Reading Room and the partners of Dorking Medical Practice.

I can report further progress in the plans to develop a new village hall and doctors' surgery in Westcott. Dorking Medical Practice, which now operates Riverbank Surgery, has received preliminary confirmation from the relevant NHS authorities that the NHS recognises the need to retain a surgery in Westcott. Formal commitment by the NHS is conditional on a number of further procedural hurdles, such as production by the doctors of a detailed business case and approval of financial parameters by the District Valuer, but nevertheless the concept has taken a significant step forward.

The Trustees of the Hut and of the Reading Room met with the partners of Dorking Medical Practice on Friday, 28 February. At such meeting the doctors unanimously confirmed their personal commitment to owning and operating a modern, purpose-built medical facility on part of the site now occupied by the Hut. As soon as the next step in the NHS decision making process is completed, which it is hoped will occur in mid-March, the doctors will commence discussions with their bankers on raising the necessary finance to cover site-acquisition and construction costs.

At the same meeting the trustees of the Hut and of the Reading Room committed to commence a legal process intended to bring about a merger of the two charities which own the sites in Furlong Road and Institute Road. A merger will make it easier to push forward with the redevelopment proposals as a single plan. Such a merger will need approval from the residents of Westcott, who are the beneficiaries of the two charities. The merger process will take some time, but in due course the trustees will publish their detailed proposals, invite comments from residents and then hold such meetings as will be needed.

In parallel with the steps I have already outlined, the trustees and the doctors will work with our planning consultants to obtain outline planning permission for these proposals. We wish to ensure that these are widely supported in the village and intend to hold one or more information meetings as soon as we have worked up more detailed plans with the planning consultants and the specialist architects who are advising the doctors on the specific requirements of the new surgery building.

The tremendous volume of responses now need to be fully analysed as it is vital that the council gets the plan right for the local generations to come.

Littering from Vehicles

Littering from a vehicle is against the law, and an offender faces a penalty notice of up to $\pounds100$ if caught in the act.

The Council is asking for your help, by reporting littering, to keep our local area clean.

You can report littering from a vehicle using the easy-to-use facility to report littering online at www.molevalley. gov.uk/littering. This allows anyone who spots an offender to share details about the offence and upload a dashcam photo.



What the council needs from you:

- what was littered
- when and where it took place
- details of who littered from the vehicle for example driver, front passenger, rear offside or nearside passenger

• whether you are aware who did it for example name and address of the person responsible

- description of the vehicle involved
- vehicle registration
- description of the person who littered (if available)
- visibility and weather conditions at the time it took place
- any other information you have to help us identify the person responsible
- willingness to provide a witness statement if the case goes to prosecution

• You can upload any photos or video footage via the form as supporting evidence.

Housing Assistance Grants



Housing Assistance grants relate to mandatory and discretionary grants that are provided by the council in

accordance with set criteria.

The Disabled Facilities Adaptation and Private Housing Improvement service is open to homeowners or private tenants in Mole Valley who meet any criteria of being aged 70 or more, have a disability, are vulnerable in some other way, or are on a means-tested benefit. The opportunities include:

• The adaptation of disabled peoples' homes to enable them to live independently in their own homes for longer and ensure their homes are suitable for their needs

• Assist for Mole Valley residents to achieve early discharge from hospital back to their homes, to minimise bed blocking and support health outcomes and recovery from illness.

• A subsidised home repair service through a Handy Person Service to enable residents to maintain a safe and secure home environment.

Mandatory Disabled Facilities Grant

The Council has a statutory obligation to administer mandatory Disabled Facilities Grants (DFGs) to provide aids and adaptations to enable disabled residents to live independently in their own homes.

The eligibility criteria, scope of the works and general requirements governing DFGs are prescribed by the Government and the Council is unable to deviate from these requirements.

The Council is required to administer DFGs to all eligible applicants irrespective of their tenure, with the exception that DFG funding is not available to use on properties owned by councils. The Council aims to work collaboratively with housing associations to fund aids and adaptations within social housing.

In some cases the extent of the aids and adaptation required for a disabled applicant is extensive. The total cost of the work may exceed the amount available under the DFG regime. Where the additional funding cannot be met by Surrey County Council, the housing association (where applicable) or the disabled resident and all other sources have been exhausted, consideration will be given to providing the necessary topup funds.

Assistance to Facilitate Hospital Discharge

This grant is available to fund those essential aids or minor works required to enable a patient to return home from hospital.

Where a Mole Valley resident is awaiting discharge from hospital but is unable to return home because additional aids are required to make the home safe, funding is available for these emergency improvements.

Home Improvement Agency & Handyperson Service

The Council provides a dedicated service for elderly and disabled residents who need extra help to undertake repairs and/or adaptations to their homes. Mole Valley uses a local Home Improvement Agency (HIA), Millbrook Healthcare, to assist with the grant process.



They have the HIA Quality Mark and will visit your property to help with forms and to obtain quotes. The officers and surveyors visit the client in their

own home to:

• assist with completing application forms

• undertake the financial check to establish the client's eligibility for grant

VICTORIA'S LITTLE BRA SHOP

I went to meet Vanessa and Victoria at the lingerie emporium at the top of West Street, to find out how such a niche shop can be so successful, when bigger and more diverse retail shops are closing down all over the country.



This mother and daughter team opened in Dorking nearly 6 years ago, and have been working together ever since, though this was the first enterprise they had done together. "What started you off?" I asked.

"We began because we realised that there isn't another shop specialising in lingerie, anywhere close. Victoria's cousin had opened a shop in Yarm, in North Yorkshire, and it was very successful. So we decided to take a leap of faith and try for ourselves here in Dorking." Mum Vanessa laughed, "We were very grateful for that family knowledge when it came to choosing which brands to stock."

I looked around at this tiny shop, full of pretty things, from silky nighties, to sports underwear, and realised that just choosing what to stock was a key decision. "How do you differentiate yourselves from the big departments stores and the chain stores?" I asked. (Google tells me that M and S sell two pairs of pants every second and forty five bras every minute!)

"It's completely different a experience" explained Vanessa. "First of all we are both properly trained." "Properly trained?" I said, surprised. "Surely it doesn't take much training to sell undies?" "Well, that's the differentiation" she said. "You go into a chain store, usually pull something off the hook, you may try it on, but probably not, because you think you know your size and shape, but actually we all change shape throughout our lives - even if our weight doesn't change much. So it's really important to have a bra that properly fits, and that's what we are trained to do. Lots of customers say they can't believe the difference in comfort that a properly fitted bra makes, and also they get the option of having that really comfortable underwear in all sorts of pretty styles. And what's more"

she added, "each of the brands has a training qualification in fitting, and we've got those qualifications, so we really do know what we are doing."

She showed me the certificates that line the walls, and then I spotted two awards certificates. One was for 2019 when the shop was awarded 'Best lingerie shop in the UK'. "We had to go to the Cafe de Paris, to receive that award - that was a great night," said Victoria. "And then we were delighted to get Dorking's Best Christmas Window award last year for our window display."

"We really like being in Dorking" she said, "there are independent shops and the town is also busy because we have supermarkets in the centre of town, so we are convenient for people to call in when they are doing their normal shopping."

These two obviously work hard at making their shop a success, and I was made most welcome, perched on a stool, having this conversation as women came in and out of the shop trying on different undies in the private cubicles, until they found what they liked. "It all looks very discreet," I said. "Yes, of course," smiled Vanessa. "This is supposed to be a good experience, and having a bra fitted might be a bit off putting to some women. So of course, we are discreet, we don't invade people's personal privacy, and we wait till we are called in, before we help the customer."

"Where do your customers come from?" I enquired. "Mostly from Dorking of course, but we have customers from Guildford, Cobham, Leatherhead and Horsham," they told me. So the girls are drawing a lot of business into Dorking that wouldn't be there otherwise. That's why independent shops work so well in a town and are so good at creating footfall.



Although the shop is busy all the time, as I could see, it wasn't crowded. It's like a little Tardis with stock and fitting rooms on each floor. "We call the upstairs floor the Boudoir" said Vanessa. "Sometimes we get friends coming together to treat each other to special undies, sometimes men bring

their wives to buy a Christmas present or a Valentine's day or birthday present and we have been known to do Prosecco evenings to groups of women about the importance of properly fitting bras for comfort and health reasons. It really is a different experience when you are wearing the brand that fits you, and the size that's right, with the straps adjusted correctly. It makes a difference to the way you stand, the way you walk, and can really change your whole posture."

I was pretty impressed, both by Vanessa and Victoria's obvious knowledge and enthusiasm, but also by their friendliness and willingness to show me round. Not only do they stock their wide range of undies, but also some very elegant swimwear, both one piece and bikinis, but also some really pretty and sometimes very luxurious night wear. Those silk nighties were just gorgeous. "Hand-washed, they last a lifetime." Said Victoria. (OK, I noted - my birthday's in July!)

But not everything was top of the range. I realised that some of the prices compared very well with department store stock, and there was plenty of what you might call everyday underpinnings as well as the more luxurious items. and panties" said Vanessa "and they only wear a small proportion of them. It's much better to have a few things that are comfortable and good to wear and properly treated they will have a long lifetime of use." "How do you recommend you wash them?" I asked. "Either on the gentle cycle in the washing machine, or a hand wash. Most of these items would dry on a towel rail overnight" said Victoria, "then you don't need so many. It's a good idea to have a good sort through every now and again, to throw out or recycle the things you don't wear. We operate a recycle scheme here with the charity Against Breast Cancer, where unwanted bras get sent to third world countries and £700 per ton gets donated to the charity."

Easter Family Activity: The Museum will be holding the latest of its popular family activities on April 9-11 and 16-18. The Dorking Cockerel is a very special bird! Join us at the Museum for an Easter hunt that reveals the name of a famous person who was very fond of Dorking Cockerels. Looking high and looking low, finding chicks and unscrambling letters – it's all part of the fun! Families are invited to drop in on those dates any time between 10am and 3.30pm. This is free with regular Museum entry. Children must be accompanied.

Our current Spring exhibition is 'How do we look at Dorking? The Town and its Landscapes over 150 years', a collection of paintings and drawings of the area, from conventional views to interesting modern interpretations of the local townscape and landscape. It features works by prominent local artists like Charles Collins (1880-1967) and those who visited and captured local views like Arthur C Fare (1876-1958) as well as more contemporary interpretations in paintings, photos and even views from a drone.

Outside the Museum, one of the exhibition's special images is displayed in the external bay window. 'Leith Hill' by Heather Ackroyd and Dan Harvey captures the subtle tones and hues of a temporary living artwork created by the artists for the 2018 Surrey Hills Arts programme. An aerial image of Leith Hill was imprinted into seedling grass through photographic photosynthesis pioneered by British visual artists Ackroyd & Harvey.



The big event in April is the annual Leith Hill Musical Festival, when a dozen local choirs take part in competitions and concerts. This year sees some changes to the structure of the festival, meaning that the choirs have greater scope to select and perform their own choice of music. On each of the three festival days there are competitions in the morning (audience welcome anytime) and then the choirs combine to present an evening concert under the baton of the festival conductor, Jonathan Willcocks, together with the orchestra of Southern Pro Musica and vocal soloists. This is a great chance to hear some big choral works performed by large choirs. The main works in this year's concerts are Vaughan Williams' grand and visionary Sea Symphony (16th), Mozart's great Mass in C minor (17th), and a contemporary work, Mirror of Perfection, composed by Richard Blackford and based on writings by St Francis of Assisi (18th). This is a lovely piece, predominantly calm and serene but also with some very dramatic sections. Together with short pieces from each of the competing choirs, every one of the three concerts looks like a very attractive programme.

The Dying of the Light at St Barnabas' church is a Tenebrae sequence of music and readings on the theme of loneliness, centred around the story of Holy Week. It is woven around a 16th-century choral masterpiece, the Lamentations by Robert White. There will also be additional music, poems and readings. The music will be sung by The Whyte Effect with the addition of a brass quartet. The performance will be followed by a drinks reception; entry is free with a retiring collection.



THE CLIMATE & ECOLOGICAL CRISIS Legal Challenges



In February the Court of Appeal ruled that plans for a third runway at Heathrow were unlawful, as they fail to take into account the need to reduce carbon emissions, in line with the UK's commitment to tackle the climate crisis, as per the Paris Agreement.

This is the first major court ruling to be based on the Paris agreement. It sets a precedent for carbon reduction targets to be considered in determining whether other highcarbon infrastructure projects should go ahead. The adverse impact that this human activity would have on the planet was judged to be more important than any potential economic gain from expanding Heathrow. Hopefully this should signal the beginning of the end for the 'business as usual' approach, which is projected to see Earth warming by around 4.3oC by the end of the century, with devastating consequences for humanity and the natural world.

Following the ruling, naturalist, Chris Packham launched a legal challenge to the HS2 rail project, arguing that its construction will impact 700 wildlife sites and around 100 ancient woodlands and that the full environmental impacts have not been properly assessed.

The principle of putting planet over profit, is something that the late lawyer, Polly Higgins, devoted her life to, in advocating for a law against ecocide.



Establishing ecocide – defined as serious damage or destruction of the natural world - as an international crime, would mean that people who commission projects causing such damage, eg chief executives or government ministers, would be legally responsible for the harm caused to others. It would be akin to other atrocities, such as genocide and war crimes. This would create one simple law that would have the power to protect the Earth.


