groups challenging the proposals on the basis that unless the pupil number decline can be significantly reversed there is a longer-term risk to the viability of the Westcott school. The consultation process will have been completed by the time you read this article (although a final decision is unlikely before the new year) but it is imperative that Westcott parents now support the Local Governina Committee and the new Headteacher (Simon Coles) in changing perceptions of the school and work towards making SHASPS the village school of choice in the area.

MVDC Local Plan (Future Mole Valley)

MVDC has now published its proposed submission draft (Regulation 19) for the Local Plan 2020-2037 which will be passed to the Planning Inspectorate. This includes proposals for future housing development. In Westcott the Westcott House site (44 dwellings proposed) has been removed from the plan, but the Mill Way site (14 dwellings proposed) is still included.

bigger potential impact for The Westcott results from the proposed two sites on the west side of Dorking on which a total of 200 houses are proposed. The development here will have some impact on the Green Belt land which protects the village from merging with Dorking, but the

greater impact will be on the A25 into Dorking. No new road infrastructure to accommodate the increased traffic is being proposed in the local plan and this is the WVA's primary concern. We are drafting our further representations for the Planning Inspector to consider in his report. We will continue to make appropriate representations when specific planning proposals are made for each site

The Future of Westcott Village

The WVA are very keen to plan for what this village looks like in 20 years' time. Many things are changing in the village: at the School, the future of The Hut and Reading Room is still uncertain, our Vicar of 24 years has just retired and the Parish Church Council is starting to think about what the village needs from his successor. As a result of the Covid pandemic attitudes to working practices and working life are changing, population changes have already started to move people out of London into this area, and families are starting to change their attitudes to their work/life balances.

We need not just to think about the future, but start to identify what things we need to do for this village to ensure that it continues to meet the aspirations of everyone, especially future generations of young people and families. This needs to be shaped by

everyone who currently lives here and is why seven years ago the Westcott Village Forum published, and residents approved, our Neighbourhood Development Plan. We need to take this work to the next stage so that together as a community we shape our future.

We have co-opted Kevin Foo who has kindly agreed to assist the WVA with this important work. He played an important part in the Westcott Village Forum, leading the survey of residents and the drafting of our Neighbourhood Development Plan prior to its adoption. The result was a plan which was representative of the needs of the whole village. As you can read in his article on pages 37-39 Kevin is encouraging everyone to feedback their priorities and ideas. We will be using this feedback to determine how best to invest our time and financial resources over the next few years.

Speed-watch

We have seven more residents who have

THE HUT & THE READING ROOM

When I wrote my update last month, the news then was that there will be no new surgery at the Hut but that there remained a chance that we might see a new village hall emerge at either the Hut or the Reading Room site, funded by a partial disposal of land for housing development. The news this month is that the Hut trustees have concluded that they do not have the resources to do anything at all with the Hut. They have therefore determined that the interests of the village are best served by them passing control of the property to the trustees of the Reading Room, who do have funds with which to explore potential redevelopment options. Quite what those options might be remains to be decided. Any redevelopment will need the usual Planning consents and, under Charity Commission rules, requires prior consultation with the village. The Reading Room trustees are not ready to commence this process.

All that is proposed now is an orderly 'hand-over' of the Hut to the Reading Room. To make that happen, the Hut trustees have first to put their affairs in order. The last Annual General Meeting of the Hut was held on 12 April 2016 and so far no reports and accounts for any of the years ending 31 December 2016 to 2020 have been presented to the village. You will find elsewhere in this magazine a formal notice of AGM from the current Hut trustees for a meeting to be held at the Reading Room on Tuesday, 23 November 2021 at which it is proposed:

(i) to correct these omissions,

(ii) on the conclusion of the AGM, for all the existing trustees to retire as trustees of the Hut and for Westcott Village Hall Trust CIO (the formal name of the Reading Room as registered with the Charities Commission) to take over as the sole corporate trustee of the Hut.

All residents of Westcott and its surrounding area aged 18 and over are entitled to be present and to vote at the forthcoming AGM. You are welcome to attend, though the business of this meeting will be purely procedural. Copies of the outstanding reports and accounts to be presented at the AGM may be viewed at www.westcottvillagehall.com and may be obtained in hard copy from Glenn Wylie, the current chairman of the Hut by emailing https://www.westcott@gmail.com. The website also hosts a copy of the Hut's constitution.

Assuming the Hut AGM proceeds as planned, the Reading Room trustees are planning early in the new year to consult with the village over a further technical reorganisation. I will report in more detail later, but (briefly) that will involve bringing the terms of the trusts on which the land at the Reading Room and the land at the Hut are held onto the same footing and to permit the Hut to be managed on the same terms as apply to the Reading Room, which (as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation, or CIO) benefits from a modern form of constitution.

Stability Pays at Stable Meadow

Now the point about all of that is to highlight that no matter how good or bad you might be at something, somewhere in our village is something for you. If you have time on your hands, or have an itch to try something new but have run out of ideas, then do get

Council Performance Monitoring

The District Council has released its performance monitoring figures for 2020-21 and for the first four months of this new financial year too. As Leader of the Opposition at Mole Valley, I get to go to Cabinet meetings to talk about the issues that residents are asking me about. This time around it was:

- -Car Parking The Council is projecting a £1.1m shortfall from parking income. It is not tracking how much each car park is being used and tells us that it doesn't know how many car parks have been refurbished so far this year. Without other actions, to make up the cost covering income shortfall might mean a 140% rise in prices to £2.40p an hour.
- Affordable Housing The Council invested no capital last year in this area and reports that is not expecting any new affordable homes to be delivered for local residents this year.
- Recycling Waste The Council isn't measuring the combined waste levels sent to landfill from our black bins and from the Community Recycling Centres but is more than 5% above its



goal for the amount of residual waste per household from the kerbside collection.

- Planning Applications – The Council says it is currently taking 176 days for planning applications to come to the Development Management Committee against the 13 week government target.

'Tis the season to consult us all

There have been three big consultations running for our village community and beyond.

The Good Shepherd Trust has been consulting on the future of the Abinger Common site for Surrey Hills All Saints Primary School, with their preference being to close that school and bring all children aged 4 to 7 on to the Westcott site.

When the new Westcott building was created, we had Reception and Key Stage 1 children at School Lane and these were transferred to Abinger a



few years ago. In the last two years, there have only been about seven new Reception pupils to the school who don't live in Westcott and so the logic for the change can be understood.

When I was the first Chair of Governors at Surrey Hills, through our Good Ofsted report and marketing we got to more than 300 pupils across the two sites and now the Academy are forecasting around half that number for September 2022. Unless pupil numbers pick up through us all marketing the strengths of the school then the configuration may need to change again.

There is an excess of capacity of around 25% across our local area and to ensure any decisions down the line are made in a planned way with the best interests of Westcott and other rural village families in mind, I have asked the County Council to commence a Dorking Schools Review.

As I flagged last month, via the website futuremolevalley.org, the District Council has published its proposals for where future development – housing and other uses – will be directed for the next fifteen or so years.

Please do take a look at these documents and make your comments on them. People are talking to me about the impact of the additional

traffic from another 214 homes trying to get into the Westcott Road queues towards Dorking as the plan narrows the greenbelt between the town and our village bring our developed areas ever closer together.


Without infrastructure investment, I'm hearing that these concerns include the impact on air quality from additional queuing cars as well as how the new junctions will actually work and the roadworks impact whilst they are being built. It is certainly going to need some creative thinking and if you have ideas on any of this then please do complete the consultation.

The third consultation that you can contribute to is by the Boundary Commission for England who are looking at how the District Council can be segmented into 13 wards of three members each from 2023.

The consultation runs until 6th December and can be found here: https://consultation.lgbce.org.uk/node/30046

Currently there are 21 wards with a mixture of one, two and three members each (Westcott highlighted on map). Although there are several options for Westcott, the emerging choices seem to be between:

- Merging in with Dorking North



- Splitting between Dorking North and whichever ward Leith Hill becomes part of
- Joining with Ockley, Leith Hill and Beare Green
- Joining with Ockley, Leith Hill and Capel
- Joining with Ockley, Leith Hill, Westhumble and Mickleham

It could be that our local councillors are accountable to residents stretching from the borders of Leatherhead to West Sussex.

It is really important that if you have a preference for which communities Westcott merges into that you let the Boundary Commission know what you think – or whether you think that this is too messy to work without our village losing it own representation.

WESTCOTT HISTORY GROUP



Annual General Meeting and "Hugh Broom and his Farm"

On 14 Sept the WLHG held its 24th Annual Meeting since it was formed in 1998 and it now has 144 paid up members. Chairman Imogen Barker and Secretary John Clachan convened the meeting, held in St Johns and summarized the Annual Report. Treasurer Glen Mardell reported that there was a net surplus of £654 for the past year and there is a healthy bank balance. Three new members were welcomed to the committee. Catherine Stevens and Helen and Jain Grainger, making a new total of nine committee members.

The short AGM was followed by a fascinatina illustrated talk Hugh Broom about the history and development of his family farm. He is the 4th generation of the Broom family to run it. His great grandfather came from a farming family in Devon and brought his dairy herd to Westcott in 1897 by train having milked them in the early morning. He was in time to milk them again in the evening. They disembarked at one of the 'halts' on the railway that runs below the Ranmore Common slope. His grandfather died in 1944 and his son continued developing the Sondes Place farm, which originally belonged to Denbies Estate but was bought out in 1921 and extended by adding on

Springfield Farm and Land Barn farm near Westcott.

It was a busy place with 3 horse drawn milk wagons and one little van which Hugh showed in a photo. There were two herds of milking cows, 50 Jerseys at Sondes Place and 60 Friesians kept at Springfield in Westcott. At this time they grew fields of hay and barley and had their own combine for harvesting – a very dusty activity. In the late seventies as a result of the European milk mountain and the introduction of milk quotas, dairy farming gave way to corn and beef and forage for the beef cattle.

In 1988 'Vanson Developments', a Richard Branson company, bought the main Sondes Place buildings to convert into residential properties leaving only the main farm house and the managers' house. When his grandfather died in the late 90's the farm started to rear sheep, kept near Springfield on the fields below Ranmore. Currently the farming operation is only with beef cattle and he tries to grow some 60 acres of green forage. Another successful

introduction at Sondes Place has been a cultivated field of asparagus, but not on a 'pick your own basis'.

Modern developments include more emphasis on the environment, with grants available for new hedging and rewilding along the edges of cropped fields where wood mice, shrews and hedge voles are flourishing together with the raptors that depend on them. Hugh pointed out that a modern farm is expected to produce food, promote diversity and provide amenity. He is very positive in thinking that technology will be able to solve many problems. He showed a photo of a large new open sided barn where black beef cattle were reared.



New silage pit

The farm is diversifying wherever possible to sustain its economy. It has developed a huge concrete lined silage pit that cuts down the need for using plastic to store silage. In a different project the farm makes use of its barn storage capacity to accommodate a battery energy storage facility built and maintained by Grid battery Storage Ltd, which is linked to Dorking electricity sub-station to support the 'time shifting' of generated electricity into periods of high price and demand.

Hugh explained how the NFU and the government were paying more attention to the country's farming products' self sufficiency and displayed an NFU tabulation that showed details of all the country's farming output by year. In total the country's overall farm self sufficiency is estimated to have dropped from a high of 78% in the mid 80's to a current level of about 60% although the self sufficiency figure for indigenous grown crops still stands at about 75%.according to a recent NFU report. Hugh is an active member of the NFU, and is well versed in the latest politics and developments in British agriculture, and has been a regular contributor to farming broadcasts and publications over the years.

At our next meeting on **Tuesday 9th Nov** the speaker will be Mark Davison, the local author, journalist and detectorist about "Digging up Westcott's Past" based on his amazing finds over the years. It will be at \$t Johns Hall at the usual time of 8pm.

WESTCOTT - WE NEED YOUR VIEWS



I'm delighted to assist the Westcott Village Association in formulating a plan that defines what we want Westcott to be in 20 years. This plan will need significant input and acceptance from most residents. My job is to find a way to capture and analyse this input and help WVA build a strategic plan that meets our community aspirations. Put another way, how can we make our precious village even better for future generations?

We do have a starting point. In late 2017 over 91% of residents approved the Westcott Neighbourhood Development Plan (WNDP). This was heavily based on a comprehensive 2011 questionnaire that had an excellent 75% response from villagers. You can find the Plan and survey on https://www.molevalley.gov.uk/home/building-planning/local-plans/closed-consultations/westcott-



neighbourhood-development-plan Ten years later, we feel a much wider consultation with the village is needed and perhaps another questionnaire is justified to address not just planning related issues, but big issues facing the village and the entire Westcott community. If we are not the architects of change in Westcott someone else will be!

In the past ten years we have seen a modest increase in housing stock from approximately 880 to 1000 dwellings and a population growth from about 2250 to 2500. The 2012 Olympics and the Annual London to Surrey cycle ride also brought more visitors to the Surrey Hills and Westcott. However, in that period we have seen The Hut, the bakery, two pubs, the Village Club, Little Doves Day Nursery, the Youth Club, Balchins store, and several other businesses close. On the positive side many of our businesses have survived and our doctors surgery is saved. These village assets will require significant financial investment and our continued patronage to remain viable.

I have taken the liberty to put down some of the issues I see, but I believe we all have to dig deeply to define the true issues that concern us and what our vision of a future Westcott is. Some questions that come to mind:

1. What do Westcott residents really want from our village and how can we achieve these aims?

- 12. The village school and the Church have a big influence on our community how can these institutions be protected and improved?
- 13. Our clubs and associations do a great job how can we help them?
- 14. How do we optimise our village assets such as St John's, The Hut, The Reading Room, Cradhurst, the Cricket ground, existing and vacant shops?
- 15. Do we work on the two A25 entrances to Westcott to make them even more welcoming and attractive?
- 16. What about the threats of fast and noisy traffic?

MUSIC IN DORKING

There are three excellent concerts in Dorking this month, covering a range from chamber music to orchestral music and a full choral-orchestral concert.

The Dorking Philharmonia, conducted by Paul Newbold, begin their programme with Haydn's last symphony, no.104 in D, written for his second and final visit to London. This will be followed by Saint-Saens' first cello concerto, with soloist Jenny Janse, and the concert will finish with Beethoven's second symphony.

The Dorking Concertgoers present the first of three recitals by the Jubilee string quartet. They open their programme with a Haydn quartet, one of the last he wrote, and follow this with a quartet movement by Schubert, one of his many incomplete compositions, but a fine work nevertheless. They finish with Beethoven's quartet in A minor, op.132, one of his so-called late quartets. It is an inward-looking piece with an intense slow movement, written as a thanks offering after the composer had recovered from a bout of illness.

The Dorking Choral Society has a special concert linked to Dorking's celebration of William Mullins, a Dorking resident who sailed with the other Pilgrim Fathers on the 'Mayflower' to America 400 years ago. (The voyage actually took place in 1620 but the celebrations were unavoidably delayed from last year.) The concert's theme is the sea, and it includes the first performance, in a newly-orchestrated version, of a set of sea shanties by local composer lan Assersohn. The concert also features extracts from Stanford's lively Songs of the Fleet, Elgar's beautifully evocative Sea Pictures, and two movements from Vaughan Williams' grand and majestic Sea Symphony.

DORKING MUSEUM



The Museum's current special exhibition, 'Darking 1620', was originally planned for last year to mark the 400th anniversary of the sailing of The Mayflower, carrying William Mullins and his family to the New World. Like other events in Dorking, however, it was a victim of the lockdown – but, equally well, it is perhaps appropriate this month to commemorate the 400th anniversary of the first 'Thanksgiving' feast in the colony.

The three-day feast held by the 'Pilgrims' (with Native Americans) at the Plymouth settlement in November 1621 did give thanks for the survival of (some of) the settlers and celebrated their first harvest but has romantically (but erroneously) passed American popular culture as the 'First Thanksgiving'. The Museum's impressive exhibition, 'Darking 1620', weaves the story of the six pilgrims from Dorking who undertook that perilous voyage to the New World with an examination of 17th century life in the town they left behind.

One exhibit attracting a lot of attention is a magnificent cross section model

the of Mavflower. created as a real labour \circ f love by the team from Dorkina Men's Shed. The plans for the model



entailed extensive research and a degree of creativity, as information on the ship itself is limited. The main frame had been prepared just as lockdown put a stop to teamwork in the Shed but work began again in earnest after reopening, by which time the exhibition had been rescheduled and the team, led by Tony Chaplin, had a real deadline to work to

The model was completed and mounted in time for the exhibition opening in September, including equipment, characters, provisions and

Gatwick Airport – Consultation on Second Runway



Gatwick Airport have plans to reconfigure their emergency runway so that it can be routinely used to expand their flight capacity, accommodating around 70 million passengers annually by 2030 and an additional 100,000 flights per year. Gatwick say that this plan

will boost the local economy and generate £1.5 billion for the region by 2038. However, the resulting increase in carbon emissions – estimated to be 1 million tonnes per year – is of great concern in this time of climate emergency, when the UK has committed to cut carbon emissions by 78% of 1990 levels by 2035.

OUR WORLD TODAY, THEIRS TOMORROW!

After a lifetime in education Brenda Ainsley, Trust u3a Eco Group Leader, regularly makes presentations to u3a groups about the Climate Crisis and some of the solutions. She recently gave a national presentation on COP26 – its aims and the problems it needs to address.



For nearly three decades the United Nationsh a ve

brought together almost every country on earth for global climate summits – 'Conference of the Parties' or COPS for short. In that time climate change has gone from being a fringe issue to a global priority. This November, leaders from 190 countries, business representatives and citizens will converge in Scotland for twelve days of talks to reach agreement on how to tackle climate change.

Most experts believe COP26 talks need to be decisive – 'our last best chance' as currently we have reached a 1.2°C rise in global temperature. The Zero Carbon Commitment is Dream, Calculate, When, Act! There are three main points to be addressed:

• Must we change? The time for talk is over. The ever-increasing release of



carbon dioxide into our atmosphere, starting with the industrial revolution, has led to a human-influenced rise in global temperatures which result in extreme weather, loss of biodiversity and reduced food supplies and health conditions. If we don't limit the global temperature rise, then large parts of

our planet near the equator will become inhospitable leading to



possibly some 1 billion climate migrants

- Can we change? We have the technology and the commitment. Society is well equipped for transformation today. So now is the best time to aim to reach net zero carbon emissions.
- Will we change? In the UK 496 councils to date have declared a 'Climate Emergency'. Surrey County Council declared in July 2019, with a target date of 2050. This will not be sufficient to meet the requirements of COP26.

We have the technology to reach net zero carbon by taking action to:

- * Reduce energy demand by building insulation and more efficient energy-consuming products, including the automotive and airline industries.
- * Power-up renewables. There already is a large expansion in wind and solar energy, but this must continue to expand massively, so that fossil fuel power generation is replaced with renewables. The current UK electricity generation mix is: 41% Fossil Fuel, 42% Renewables and 17% Nuclear. Enough solar energy reaches the earth every hour to fill all the world's energy needs for a whole year.
- * Offset the rest of our carbon emissions

by planting more trees - they absorb carbon dioxide - and other carbon capture technologies.

What do you think about active travel in Surrey?
