SPIRITUAL BUT NOT RELIGIOUS? SO AM I!

One of the common narratives in the popular media is one of constant secularisation and declining religious attendance in Britain. Everything from the Census to the British Social Attitudes Survey points

to people being less inclined to affiliate with an organised religion. Speaking to many people, perhaps you are one of them, there is a sense that 'organised religion' is not for them. And yet they are convinced that matter is not

all that matters. That there is more to life than atoms, avocados and apartments. They as humans have some sort of spiritual nature. Hence the term 'Spiritual but not Religious' (SBNR).



To be honest, I completely get it. I have grown up in the culture where the oxygen I breathed was a postmodernism which was suspicious of specific truth claims and distrustful of institutions. Public scandal after public scandal has decimated trust in institutions which were previously broadly seen as being a flawed yet significant force for good. For many 'religion' equates to narrow ideas. ritualistic gestures and institutionalised Spirituality deities.

> as a term is gloriously free from institutional hang ups and the concept of restriction which swirl around the term religion. If this definition stands, then I am most certainly SBNR. So is Jesus.

If you are a spiritual person, my request to you is that you don't

rule out 'the church' as place of spiritual encounter. The bible word for church has nothing to do with religion or buildings but is just the word for a gathering of ordinary people. My spiritual encounters have come amid mountain top gales and while sat in silence on a sofa – but they also take place in the community called church gathering in the name of Jesus.

For those of you on your spiritual quest, especially for whom church is a dead religious word, I would add this. I have sat by Buddhist stupas in

the Himalayas and read the Tao Te Ching by foreign flowing streams and contemplated the Way contained therein. I have embraced silence in the dappled forest and entered sacred spaces rich with incense. I have gaped in wonder at great Mosques and wandered through abandoned temples claimed back by the forest. But in no place, or thing, or book, or practice, have I encountered the spiritual reality of the cosmos as I have when praying

in the name of Jesus. Sometimes alone. Sometimes with others. Sometimes even amid a dusty old church building. An awesome Spirituality that echoes back to the beginning of it all and will be there at the end.

"MORE IMPORTANTLY DON'T RULE OUT JESUS. HE MAY JUST BE THE VERY THING YOU HAVE BEEN LOOKING FOR ALL ALONG."

You don't have to agree with me - I would love to hear of and learn

from your spiritual or religious experiences – but please don't rule out church, and more importantly don't rule out Jesus. He may just be the very thing you have been looking for all along.



The River Mole – Its history, personalities and present-day problems



There have been several local lectures concerning the history of the river and the current efforts to m e a s u r e and control pollution. The

lecture by Prof Richard Selly explained how part of the flat plate of Wealden Clay underlaid by chalk was uplifted to form the North Downs, from which the clay was eroded leaving the chalk exposed. The North Downs were in fact the southern edge of the last ice age.

A map from 1762 was the first to show the course of the River Mole above ground from its source in Baldhorns Copse, south of Rusper. It has a catchment area of some 48 square miles and runs through Gatwick to Brockham and Dorking, where it collects the Pipp Brook at Pixham, and flows north through the North Downs Gap between Ranmore Common and Box Hill. It continues past Cobham, Leatherhead and Esher to enter the Thames at East Molesey near Hampton Court, having run some 80 km in all. Much of the route lies on impermeable Wealden clay south of the North Downs and London Clay north of the

Downs which is the reason why the river responds rapidly to heavy rainfall.

Between Brockham and Leatherhead the river bed changes to permeable chalk and the increased gradient allows the water table to drop below the river bed. Aerial photos show a line of green patches in the fields between Pixham and Mickleham which are the relict holes where the underground water comes to the surface (circled red on map). River water from Mickleham Bends follows an underground course coming up in Fetcham Ponds, which have never been known to dry up. This was described in Brayley's History of Surrey in 1868.

In medieval times the numerous place names ending in 'ham' were probably small farming communities which had survived since the Iron Age in this area. The Domesday Book lists some 20 mills on the river between Reigate and Cobham. A manor house was built in 1331 on a mound beside the River Mole at Esher, attributed to Bishop John Stratford (1323 – 1333). This was the site where Esher Palace was later built by

the Bishopric of Winchester and occupied by Cardinal Wolsey in 1519. Cardinal Wolsey (1473-1530) lived here beside the River Mole while he

built Hampton Court Palace which was only 3 miles away on the River Thames. Wolsey entered the service of Henry

VII in 1507 aged 34 and continued with Henry VIII in 1509 as an Almoner with a seat in the Privy Council. He was made the Catholic Archbishop of York in 1514 and a Cardinal by Pope Leo X in 1515. He was the King's adviser and Chancellor for many years and was particularly involved in foreign affairs. But he failed to arrange an annulment of the King's marriage to Catherine of Aragon so that he could marry Ann Boleyn. Wolsey was stripped of his government offices and his property but was permitted to remain Archbishop of York and sent to Cawood Castle in Yorkshire. It was here, while boarding a river barge, that he hit his head on a beam and died at Leicester on 29th November 1530. He was buried in Leicester Abbey.

In 1884 the Leatherhead District Water Company was created and drilled a hole 200ft deep and began distributing water to houses in the area as the population grew. From this time onwards similar developments took place in Dorking and the surrounding area. With population growth there was an increase in transport, public utilities including sewage treatment plants, agriculture and other small industries. The Water Company and the Environmental Agency were not able to keep up with the degradation in quality of the river water. After an excessive spillage of 2180 hours of sewage in 2020, a group of volunteers set up a small charity called 'RiverMoleRiverWatch' to organise a system of regular river water sampling at specific sites on the river (www. rivermoleriverwatch.org.uk). The aims are:

1. to co-ordinate the efforts of concerned local citizens

2. regularly test water quality in the river and its tributaries

3. monitor the state of the river

4. work with everyone who can improve the situation

5. hold to account those who have responsibility for water quality, in particular the local water treatment companies, and Thames Water and the Environment Agency

6. campaign to press for action to improve the situation by lobbying politicians, companies and organisations

They plan to achieve these aims by engaging with communities, custodians, polluters and regulators and by sharing information with the various groups like Thames Water, Gatwick Airport and other industries and agricultural farms etc. RMRW has been collecting data since May 2023. they developed a mobile survey app. Volunteers record water quality, test measurements and observations at their river test sites. They also record river flow level, weather and known pollution discharges from Sewage Treatment Works. There are some 30 test sites. Collected data is aggregated and analysed to give a comprehensive overview of the river condition which can be portrayed on a chart. Typical data recorded for August are:

Total catchment for August (average ppm) Phosphate 0.96, Nitrate 25.1, Ammonia 0.27 with a running mean of Phosphate 0.76, Nitrate 25.9, Ammonia 0.27.

Findings show that Sewage Treatment Works are the prime source of measured pollutants. Aariculture introduces significant levels of pollutants but generally lower than Sewage Treatment Works. Tests for Ecoli samples are analysed at the Zero Hub community laboratory in Guildford and these tests indicate the presence of faecal contamination from sewage works, animal waste and run-off from agricultural land. The test for Ecoli cells utilizes UV light making them fluoresce. Activities involving direct contact with contaminated water is a danger to health and is the cause of gastro-intestinal illness.

on their website showing the status of the waterways including tributaries in this catchment area from good to bad. For instance the Leigh Brook is very badly polluted but the Pipp Brook is very good until after it joins the River Mole and passes the Dorking Gap. Similar trusts doing similar activities exist for other river systems where people are concerned about the river water quality. These include the River Wey Trust which has been in existence for some time www.zerocarbonguildford. org/river-qual and the Trent River Trust in Nottinghamshire which includes the Dove, the Derwent, the Soar, the Cole and the Blithe. This is a much bigger organisation and has been going for 20 years www.trentriverstrust.org/. The RMRW is young by comparison and on its website it is inviting people to join it as a member and receive periodical news. Donations are invited to help pay for the cost of sampling.



Happy New Year and welcome to 2025. We hope it brings new adventures as well as small things for us all to be grateful for every day.

lookina back briefly Firstly, to Christmas, we want to thank the team of volunteers who put up the Christmas Tree on the village green - Hugh Broom, Paul Goddard, Andy Gray, Tony Astor, Tim Way and Andrew Lewis, who all did a great job. It was put up a few days later than originally planned due to Storm Darragh but it was worth the wait especially when we gathered around it to sing Christmas Carols the week before Christmas. The tree was once again sponsored by the WVA, Westcott Gardeners Club and Westcott 100 Club.

Public Consultations and Development Pressure

2024 was a busy year for WVA. A seemingly endless flow of major planning applications and important consultations have come out of Surrey County Council and Mole Valley and we have done our very best to publicise these, whilst carefully representing the views of our residents. The most recent was for the Draft Dorking Masterplan where we hope we have been successful in getting removed a proposal to pedestrianise

West Street and to close it to all traffic. There is now a new Mole Valley Local Plan and planning applications for the two major allocated sites between Westcott and Dorking - Sondes Place Farm and Milton Court Lane - are yet to be determined. We continue to voice residents' concerns about the inadequate walking and cycling infrastructure between Westcott and Dorking. Together with an infrequent bus service these factors make our community more car dependent than it could be. These two major sites potentially add another 500 vehicles to the already congested A25 on the approach to the Dorking one way system. We believe we are at a critical point for Westcott residents being able to access essential services and transport in Dorking and we are making more noise on these topics.

Surrey County Council Rights of Way (ROWIP) Consultation

You may recall that back in March the WVA sought your views on how the existing network of footpaths, bridleways and Byways in and around Westcott could be improved and this was fed into the initial consultation. SCC have now completed their main report and they are once again seeking your views via an online survey. The survey can be found at www.surreysays.co.uk/environment-

The process will be shaped by three Working Groups – Data Collection (Ied by Dr. Chris Smewing), Policy (Ied by Ian Dunsford) and Communications (Ied by Jo Astor).

The overall work proaramme is expected to take 12 to 18 months to complete and Kevin Foo has kindly volunteered to be the Programme Manager. Work will start in earnest in the new year. Over 100 people have expressed an interest in taking part in the Village Forum so far, with 42 people attending the first meeting. Building between the vines – the story of the Denbies Lego house



The Museum's current temporary exhibition brings to life the story of when, back in 2009, James May built a full-size Lego house between the vines of the Denbies Wine Estate. The house was part of a BBC television entitled series James May Toy Stories, in which he took some of the country's best-loved children's toys and built large scale models from them. May did not want a Lego copy of a regular house and a very bold, uncompromising modern design was chosen. The two-storey house took almost 2.000 volunteers to build over a five-week period, using over 3.3 million bricks and setting a world record for the largest Lego house.

Lego house included furniture, furnishings, kitchen appliances, even a



shower, sink and flushing loo on the top floor. After the opening party, May stayed in the house for one rainy September night. The house remained at Denbies for four days before being demolished, with the bricks collected up and donated to charity.

The exhibition tells how and why it was built. A collection of specially designed Lego models of buildings and objects with a Dorking connection are on display, and there are other activities for children. A Lego Dorking Cockerel trail around the museum, with prizes, will run alongside the exhibition from January 11th.

The first museum family activity of the new year is Dorking's Fabulous Creatures at Dorking Library, St. Martin's Walk on Saturday 11th January, 10am to 1pm. Reality check

Leaving the certainty of last year behind and heading into a new year always gives me pause for thought. Ever since I learnt in detail about global environmental issues, as part of an Open University degree completed in 2017, each passing year has clanged like a bell marking another year without proportionate action to deal with the multiple crises we face. The 2024 Global Risk Report from the World Economic Forum states the top four risks over the next ten year period as:

- 1. Extreme weather events
- 2. Critical change to Earth systems
- 3. Biodiversity loss and ecosystem collapse
- 4. Natural resource shortages

Scientists have made it abundantly clear that in order to avert climate catastrophe we must radically reduce the burning of fossil fuels. That burning fossil fuels would lead to potentially catastrophic climate impacts was known by oil companies, such as ExxonMobil in the late 1970s and has been more widely warned about by climate scientists since the late 80s. Yet since we have known of the problem, more damage has been done to the climate – ie more CO2 emissions have been released into the atmosphere - than in the rest of history. So the auestion we need to ask is:

Why have we not done what we know we needed to do?

reasons, which are difficult to cover in a short article. However, money, wealth and power created by the extraction and exploitation of fossil fuels and the ways in which this is tied into our economic, ecological and social systems, plays a major role.

Misinformation has played a role in the delaying of climate action, particularly in the form of greenwashing by industries. Technological pollutina solutions to reducing emissions, such as carbon capture and storage, have been pushed by those whose interests it serves to maintain the status quo, deflecting attention away from more simple remedies such as decreasing energy demand. Excluding nature based methods such as reforestation, current levels of technology-based carbon dioxide removal only accounts for about one millionth of the carbon dioxide emitted from fossil fuels.

Also a factor is that many of the wealthiest countries and individuals, who are responsible for the vast majority of emissions, are not yet as severely affected by extreme weather

e v e n t s . Therefore, it can be easier to turn a blind eye to the issues.

On our current trajectory, things are not looking good. The State of Climate 2024 report makes clear that 'The record-breaking rainfall and flooding, rapidly intensifying tropical cyclones, deadly heat, relentless drought and raging wildfires that we have seen in different parts of the world this year are unfortunately our new reality and a foretaste of our future'. 1.5°C warming is here now, and many impacts are occurrina faster than expected. Warming is accelerating towards 3°C+ (Collision Course Report, Breakthrough)

With every fraction of a degree rise the severity and frequency of dangerous heatwaves, destructive storms and other disasters increases. At 3°C, scientists say, the world could pass tipping points that would drastically change the planet's climate, such as the collapse of polar ice caps leading to a huge rise in sea levels.

How can we reduce the impacts of the climate crisis?

Looking at the reality of climate breakdown can be frightening and overwhelming. Yet we need to look clearly at it to understand what it means for us and our children and to help to focus attention on what is important. We have been distracted by money and lulled into the role of passive consumers, encouraged to rely on technological fixes to our problems, our senses dulled to the cost in human

exploitation and nature destruction that underpins the majority of our systems of material wealth creation. Philosopher Jain McGilchrist, contends that we are in the midst of a spiritual crisis. We need to move beyond a mechanistic view, recover our sense of the sacred and focus on our humanity and the fundamental human need to love and be loved. Love has always played a key role in human survival. We need other humans in order to live. Social co-operation and the building of relationships are crucial in accomplishing many essential tasks reproduction, learning, sharing food and other resources, seeking safety and raising children. We must reject divisive and anti-human narratives and come together to collaborate, for the love of life, to:

Reduce fossil fuels

Ourlives have become very dependent on fossil fuels but we there are plenty of ways to reduce the amount we use. This is not a choice, but a necessity at this point in time.We are more dependent on having a hospitable planet to provide for our basic needs

– food, water, shelter.


