A DIFFERENT KIND OF SUMMER HOLIDAY

Are you planning on heading off over the summer months to have some kind of vacation? We are certainly hoping to get away for a few days here and there. With four children in tow, holidays are not

exactly restful, but they are extremely precious times.

There is another way of travelling – one that seeks to offer a different kind of rest and relaxation. It is the ancient act of pilgrimage. Now,

admittedly, at various points in history religious pilgrimages were pretty much the ancient equivalent of package holidays, replete with souvenirs, much drinking, occasional brawls and generally causing a headache for the local populace. If you have ever read Geoffrey Chaucer's Canterbury Tales you could be left with this view of pilgrimage as a sort of 14th century Club 18-30.

But pilgrimage as a concept is something deeper.

It is an intentional act of setting out on a journey to seek meaning, purpose, direction and, just possibly, the divine. The trip itself may be long or short. It is the act of setting out which defines the nature of the journey. That, and the willingness to leave everything that isn't absolutely essential behind. Especially those things which demand attention and offer no ultimate fulfilment – phones, social media, podcasts, the endless news cycle.

The beauty of this is that anyone

can go on a pilgrimage. Maybe you are fortunate enough to be in a position where you could set out on a well-trod pilgrims path for a week or two along the Camino

de Santiago in Spain or Saint Cuthbert's way taking you from the ruins of Melrose Abbey in Scotland to the Holy Island of Lindisfarne in Northumbria (a place you simply must visit if you get the chance).

Maybe you are at a moment in life They which is defined by responsibilities to children, work, or being a full time carer for a loved one – but perhaps you could set off on half day trek to Guildford Cathedral with your phone on mute to find some stillness. Maybe your mobility is limited but you could make your way up the hill as an act of pilarimage to Westcott Church (which a wonderful team of volunteers from across the village arrange to keep open during the day). Or if that is too far, then a walk to the kettle or a seat in the garden can be an intentional set aside journey of seeking and openness.

I have found that acts of intentional pilgrimage like these, both big and small, have been transformational moments in my own journey – even more so than holidays to beautiful places.

They have, sometimes unexpectedly, been times when Jesus has been more than an abstract figure but a very real and undeniable presence and peace. The Bible says: 'Draw near to God and He will draw near to you' (James 4.8). That is my lived experience.

Pilgrimages tend to change people in unexpected ways regardless of their faith or prior expectations. The BBC series Pilgrimage (available now on iPlayer) which takes a diverse group of celebrities on such a journey offers a good sense of this. So this summer, amidst all your other plans, why not take a pilgrimage – to a cathedral, a mountain, or your sofa – to breath in the deeper things. You can visit britishpilgrimage.org for inspiration. Who knows what you might find.



Look out for day-flying moths

July is a good month to look out for moths, as many are now on the wing. While most moth species are nocturnal and so fly at night, there are plenty of day-flying moths to look out for. In fact, here in the UK there are actually more day-flying moths than there are butterflies.

One colourful species that is found throughout most of the UK is the Cinnabar moth, so named for the red on their hindwings and markings on their forewings. Their black and yellow caterpillars are often found munching their way through Common Ragwort. Head to arasslands and heathlands to look for them. Another red and black

moth found in grasslands is the Six-spot Burnet. You can identify it by counting the six spots on each forewing – but be warned, sometimes the outmost spots can merge together.

WESTCOTT HISTORY GROUP



350 Years of South Eastern Weather by Ian Currie



lan Currie has spent his life recording weather the of the North Downs and the Weald and writing about the extremes of weather in

Britain. He is a full-time weatherman, broadcaster, author, columnist, speaker and editor of Weather Eye magazine and a Fellow of the Royal Meteorological Society. He gave us an extensive talk, accompanied by an amazing collection of slides, on several centuries of weather with particular reference to SE England, from 7 metre high snowdrifts, cricket ball sized hail, blazing summers to violent tornadoes or devastating floods.

lan started his talk looking at the varying climate over this period and explaining that a 30 year average gives us data for assessing climate change. Information about changing weather patterns can be collected from tree ring analysis, soil samples, ship's logs, diaries: all of these can give us some understanding of weather patterns over time. After thermometers were invented, vicars and people in country houses kept regular temperature readings, many of which have survived.

The bulk of lan's talk concerned major weather events, which would have had a massive impact on people living at the time. We were told about the great storm of 1703, when there were 160 mile an hour winds off the Kent coast, leading to an enormous death toll in southern England (estimates of 15,000 have been suggested) as people were unable to find shelter and of course, the one in most people's memories, that of 1987, which had a huge impact locally.

He mentioned extremely cold winters between the 16th and 19th centuries when Frost Fairs were regularly held on the Thames, and in particular that of 1683-1684, with the river frozen over at London some 12" thick for two months. The eruption of Mount Tambora, in the Fast Indies in 1815. drastically lowered temperatures in the Northern Hemisphere over the next 2-3 vears, and resulted in the "vear without a summer" in 1816. This had a huge impact on agriculture in the UK, Europe and the US and may explain why an ancestor might have moved at this time.

In 1881 there was a memorable Great Snow Storm which covered the country from top to bottom, a violent hailstorm in 1911, and very cold winters during WWII and that of 1962-63 still recalled by some of us. The very dry sunny time we have had this year from mid March till mid May will likely prove to be

unmatched for centuries.

lan's collection of facts and figures on our weather was almost encyclopaedic and the question and answer session at the end was as entertaining as the jumper he wore.

LETTER FROM GREAT GRANDMOTHER IMOGEN

Here is a letter written by a great grandmother to her grandchildren and great grandchildren. It is a lovely reminder of how times have changed and also of what has stayed the same, over the years.

Greetings Grandchildren! I have been asked by Grandson Tobias to share a few childhood memories, some of which may surprise you, some of which you may recognize!

I was born as the Battle of Britain raged during the second world war. As a toddler, I accompanied my grandmother as she shut the shutters against lighting a route for the German bombers as they flew north to Liverpool. I celebrated the end of the war in 1945 riding on my father's shoulders down the Mall towards Buckingham palace, to see King George and Queen Elizabeth on the balcony. In 1953 aged 12, I had my first glimpse of TV as I watched the coronation procession of Queen Elizabeth 2. We finally owned a TV when I was 24.

I remember rationing, sharing one Mars Bar per week with the family of 6, seeing my first

bananas and oranges at 5 years old, queueing at the gasworks in Leatherhead for a bucket of coal to keep the fire burning (no central heating), going to primary school in a pony and trap due to petrol rationing. Being wrapped in a rug for a winter car journey, (no heating again), playing I spy games in the car as no radio, (certainly no ipad!) and passing squashed hedgehogs - now nearly extinct - on the road and



seeing the windscreen covered in bugs whereas now there are no bugs.

I helped my grandmother to tear newspapers into squares to use as toilet paper. I learned to swim in an unheated pool, I was not allowed to use the public pool for fear of polio, I did catch whooping cough and measles, and lay in bed listening to Dick Barton, Special Agent and Children's Hour on the radio.

I learned to ride my bike by falling off, no stabilisers then, and to ride a horse, also by falling off (and getting back on again)! I danced the polka as my grandmother played the piano, and to an old gramophone with '78' classical records. I learned to milk a cow by hand, and was kicked across her stall, but made to get back under her and continue.

I felt shy at parties, but there were not many given, as they were expensive. I felt free riding my bike alone



down the Oxshott road aged 9 to visit friends and felt safe to wander on the family farm and on oil lamp lit holidays in Anglesey. We always took a picnic if we went out, which was rarely, as my father worked a 6 day week, of boiled eggs, brown bread sandwiches, dates, fruit, and after swimming in the sea, a square of chocolate and a digestive biscuit.

I think the biggest change in my lifetime has been the tremendous increase in lifestyle opportunities for most people, and the revolution in communication, some positive, some negative. But one thing does not change, and that is human nature! One of the exciting things about being a grandmother for me is the fact that I know people who have lived over a span of 200 years. my Grandfather was born in 1865, and my grandchildren will hopefully live for most of the 2000s. I wonder what you will write in turn for your grandchildren! I have had fun. I hope you do too!



DISTRICT COUNCILLOR UPDATE



It's been a busy few months at Mole Valley District Council, and we wanted to share some key updates including

potential changes that could reshape local government across Surrey. We're pleased to announce that Mole Valley's Local Plan has been shortlisted for the Royal Town Planning Institute's Awards for Planning Excellence. Among the many features receiving national recognition are two important commitments:

- A requirement that all new developments deliver a net gain in biodiversity, supporting and enhancing our natural surroundings.
- A commitment that at least 40% of new homes be affordable, helping local families, first-time buyers, and younger residents put down roots in areas like Westcott.

The biggest change on the horizon is the Government's plan for Local Government Reorganisation (LGR). Currently, Surrey has a two-tier system: Surrey County Council handles highways, education, and social care, while Mole Valley District Council looks after housing, planning, waste collection, and leisure. Under LGR, these services would be merged into new unitary authorities - single councils delivering all local government

functions. The aim is to reduce duplication, improve efficiency, and open the door to greater local powers. In February, County Council elections were cancelled, and councils across Surrey were asked to submit their proposals for how the new system should work. At the council meeting in May, Mole Valley supported the two-unitary proposal, where Surrey would be divided into East and West. Under this proposal, Mole Valley would join EImbridge,

Epsom & Ewell, Reigate & Banstead, and Tandridge to form an East Surrey authority.



Of the options presented, we believe this provides a balance between being large enough to streamline services and finances, whilst retaining some locality and sense of place to remain responsive. Critically, the model meets all the criteria set out by the Government and ensures each division would be represented by at least two councillors. Of course, reorganisation brings challenaes. The transition will be complex and although costly, and long-term savings are expected, financial uncertainty remains - especially with the Government's new funding model potentially reducing central support. That's why we've written to the Minister of State, Jim McMahon MP, and to

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR UPDATE

Surrey County Council, supporting the two-unitary approach while pushing for key safeguards:

- Three councillors per division
- The option to create new town or parish councils in areas like Westcott.
- Protection for valued community assets including libraries, village halls, and leisure centres.
- Flexibility for new councils to offer enhanced services where residents want them.
- Continued focus on climate commitments.
- A fair funding settlement including writing off Woking and Spelthorne's debts, which would otherwise burden taxpayers across both new authorities.

Here in Westcott, the question of parish councils is especially relevant. As an unparished area, we may soon be included in a Community Governance Review to explore forming new town or parish councils. In other parts of the country, these have played a vital role in preserving and delivering local services - particularly where larger councils have had to scale back. That said, several questions remain:

- •How will smaller parish councils be supported financially and administratively?
- Will services like leisure centres and public toilets continue to receive funding?
- What happens if the Government does not write off existing council debts?
- How will residents' views be gathered and reflected?
- And what shape will local democracy

take under the new system?

LGR Timeline at a Glance:

- December 2024 Government publishes Devolution White Paper
- February 2025 County Council elections cancelled
- May 2025 Proposals for new unitaries submitted
- Summer/Autumn 2025 Government reviews proposals
- Early 2026 Shadow Authorities formed
- May 2026 Elections to new councils
- April 2027 New authorities take full control

Mole Valley continues to serve residents while preparing for this once-in-a-generation reform: ensuring Westcott's voice is heard every step of the way.

DORKING MUSEUM



A Place of Safety:



The Museum's s u m m e r exhibition, A Place of Safety, tells the stories of the various groups of refugees who

have found refuge in Dorking and the surrounding villages, and their experiences of generous support – and occasional conflict. It starts with the eminent group of émigrés fleeing the French Revolution in 1792 and taking up residence in Juniper Hall on the slopes of Box Hill. In the 20th century, they were followed by those fleeing the Kaiser's army in 1914, Nazi oppression in the late 1930s, and the Blitz in 1940.

The work of the Dorking Refugee Committee, in which Ralph Vauahan Williams was a leading voice. featured. The story continues in the



present century with refugees from war and persecution in the Middle East. The treasures on show include the Dorking Nursery Scrapbook from the 1940s, showing the experiences of those bombed out of their homes, and four beautifully detailed dolls, made by Mickleham and Westhumble WI in the 1970s and representing the high-profile French émigrés of the 18th century.

DESERT ISLAND DISCS



Reverend Tim Armstrong

Imagine if you will a cross between Anthony Trollope's Warden and BBC's Vicar of Dibley and that's my impression of this month's castaway. The Reverend Tim has Mr. Harding's depths of faith and desire to serve his community and Geraldine's warmth, humour and accessibility. He does not of course have her girth, he is fit, running most days, nor the narrowness of outlook of Barchester clerics. He is widely read, with interests spanning Dostoevsky to Hardy, and open to challenge.

There are seven steps to becoming a C of E vicar. First you have to join the Church of England. Tim grew up in a Christian family by virtue of his father being a vicar. His early life was spent in Shropshire where music and singing were very much the order of the day with the dining table ringing with verses of Flanders and Swann's The gas man cometh voiced by the four young Armstrongs. Tim's was a happy upbringing where, he says, his parents' faith and service were his living reality. Although never pushed and despite his share of teenage angst in which Indie Rock featured, Tim pretty much always knew he too wanted to serve. Ruling out being a vicar, he had more romantic ideas of a missionary vocation. This was fueled by what he described as an early transformative experience offered to him by his father.

The most exotic place the fifteen year

old Tim had been was Wolverhampton when his Dad invited him to a project in Nepal. Those two weeks in Kathmandu hooked Tim, leading to his second step of completing a theological degree at Redcliff College, Gloucester. Here he was immersed in the multiple nationalities of fellow students creating lituray from their various heritages. This exposure was further explored through his study of anthropology. But it was also a time for questioning, guided by a favourite philosophy professor inspiring students to take their walls down and dig into their roots. The cross cultural and searching themes are reflected in Tim's disc choices: Gone by the band Switchfoot and Chopin's Prelude Opus. 28, No. 15, also known as Raindrops. The first is from an album. The Beautiful Letdown all about the human condition, and the second by way of contrast is more meditative, allowing time to ground his beliefs.

His third step took a while as he was not quite ready to jettison his plans for missionary work in South East Asia. He took a six week placement in Peckham which turned out to be a wonderful mix of African, Caribbean, South American, Indian and Bangladeshi. It was here Tim met Jenny. Marrying in 2010, they danced to *One Love* by Bob Marley and the Wailers. Tim's choice of Guvna B's song *Nothing but the Blood* represents something of the challenging demands of youth work which he and Jenny carried out

for seven years. Then he had what he described as a sudden awakening, a palpable push towards parish life. With Jenny's support, he took his forth step and further training at St John's College, Durham. In keeping with the splendour of the cathedral, Tim chose Thomas Tallis' lovely choral piece Spem in Allium (Hope in the other) and the quieter Come thou Fount by Kings Kaleidoscope.

Spending his curacy in Southfields being ordained as a deacon (step 5) then as a vicar (step 6) taking his final step of being licenced, Tim was free to apply to a parish. He and Jenny poured over parish profiles courtesy of unlimited coffee in Wetherspoon's and the one for Westcott he thought fitted him to a tee. The rest as they say, is history. His final musical choice is Duke Ellington's Mean a Thing which contains the line 'give it everything you got' which is the signature of Tim's commitment to all our community here in Westcott.

His choice of luxury was his running shoes and the one record he would cherish is Come Thou Fount which he says reminds him of his core beliefs. And the book, the Narnia Chronicles by C.S. Lewis. I think he can be permitted to have the seven volumes in a compendium in keeping with the seven steps that brought him to Westcott.

The Beauty of Butterflies

A brief glimpse of a butterfly fluttering in the sunshine is a sight that fills my heart with joy. It is especially wonderful to have the chance to observe the intricate patterns on their delicate wings, as they soak up energy from the sun.



Transience

A butterfly's fleeting beauty evokes of the delicacy of life. Their lifespan is short – ranging from a week to a month – and reminds of the precious nature of life, encouraging us to be fully present in the here and now.

Their sensitivity to weather, limited range (some butterflies never leave their own woodland!) and short lifecycle that butterflies means adapt quickly to changes in their environment. Therefore, they can be a valuable indicator - both for overall habitat health and for the wellbeing of other insects. Because we are attracted to them and it is relatively easy to tell one species from another, butterflies are one of the bestmonitored insects globally.

Alarmingly, research shows that the number of butterflies in the UK has been decreasing over the past 50 years, with over a third of species being in significant decline. This is largely due to lack of suitable habitats caused by changes in farming practices and the growth of industrialised agriculture - which relies heavily on the use of pesticides - and urbanisation. Climate breakdown is also impacting butterflies. The wet spring of 2024

c o u p l e d with the late arrival of summer heat resulted in a dramatic fall in the



number of butterflies observed during the annual Big Butterfly Count, leading wildlife charity, Butterfly Conservation, to declare a national 'butterfly emergency'.

Being an indicator of how the natural world is faring, this is a stark warning sign for all life on our planet, including us humans. Moreover, butterflies and their caterpillars play a valuable role in the food chain, including in the diet of birds and their offspring. Fewer caterpillars means fewer birds.

Butterflies are deeply symbolic, particularly because of their unique lifecycle. The process by which a caterpillar transforms, into a cocoon

and then emerges as a beautiful butterfly, is a powerful metaphor for significant life changes and unforeseen possibilities. This inspires hope. When we fully appreciate the deep entanglements between humans and the web of life, we become aware of our interdependence and the reciprocal role that we can play in the world.

Our role

Humans have a great ability to learn and adapt. Thanks to the dedicated work of many lepidopterists, from Richard South, who wrote a guide on 'Butterflies of the British Isles' in 1906, to local butterfly expert Gail Jeffcoate, we have a wealth of information on how to work in harmony with the natural world to regenerate habitat to help butterflies.

Adult butterflies mostly feed on nectar, which they will take from wildflowers and cultivated garden flowers. and wildflowers. To attract them, grow plants to provide nectar all through from spring to autumn, including:

aubretia, Buddleia, candytuft, hebe, sedum, lavender, michaelmas daisy, marjoram, perennial wallflower, red valerian, verbena bonariensis. And don't forget the importance of messier, uncultivated greas for wildflowers too.

Looking after butterflies is not simply just a matter of providing nectar rich plants for them to feed on. To increase their numbers, they need to reproduce, and different types of butterflies need specific plants, that their caterpillars have evolved to feed on, on which to lay their eggs (please see the list at the end of this article). And anyone who has read the wonderful children's book The Hungry Caterpillar, will have an idea of the amount of food a caterpillar needs to prepare for the incredible transformation it will go through!

Additionally, please help feed into the bigger picture of how butterflies are faring by taking part in the 2025 Bia Butterfly Count. This runs from 18th July to 10th August and people are asked to spend 15 minutes (preferably in sunny weather) counting the different butterflies you see wherever you are - walking along the street, in a park, woodlands or your garden. For more information search Big Butterfly Count on the internet or contact us at info@greenwestcott.org I, for one, cannot bear to think of a world without butterflies. With their notable decline nature is sounding an alarm

call! We must act now to stop harmful practices and help create and protect habitats in which butterflies and their caterpillars can thrive, so that our children and grandchildren will have the chance to know their beauty too.

Plants for Breeding Butterflies

Here are some specific plants which butterflies need to lay their eggs:

Holly – Holly Blue will lay spring brood on holly buds

Ivy – Holly Blue late summer brood on flower buds. (Red Admirals feed on this too) Alder Buckthorn- Brimstone

Cuckooflower (Ladies' smock) - orange tips

Nettles – peacocks, commas, red admirals, small tortoiseshells

Nasturtiums (and brassicas!) – Large White and Small White



Blackthorn – Brown Hairstreak lays in September on young shoots (many are lost when hedges are cut) Common Sorrel – Small copper Birdsfoot trefoil – Common Blue

Many eggs are lost when areas of long grass and hedges are cut in the late summer and autumn. Leave some areas uncut to help them survive.



9th 1877 The inaugural Lawn Tennis Championship was played on top of the croquet lawns at Wimbledon, Spencer W Gore taking the men's singles title.


14th 1858 Birth of Emmeline Pankhurst, English suffragette who suffered imprisonment in order to gain the vote for women
